## Confederation Centre Gets \$10,000 Grant

The Confederation Centre has received a \$10,000 grant from the Canada Council to assist with the production of the musical play, *Anne of Green Gables*, which will be one of four plays or revues appearing in repertory during the year's summer festival.

The musical is based on Lucy Maud Montgomery's famous novel and is being written by Donald Harren and the music by Norman Campbell.

This summer's *Anne of Green Gables* will be a world premiere for a full length musical stage play of the book. It was done some years ago in an hour-long television show.

A talent hunt by Mavor Moore is now underway throughout the country to find a suitable actress for the part of Anne.

The announcement of the \$10,000 grant was made by the Canada Council. Other grants announced at the same time were \$50,000 to the Toronto-based National Youth Orchestra, for its 1965 training session; a tour of

Western Canada and a special seminar for teachers; a \$20,000 grant to the Vancouver Festival to assist the participation of local artists in this summer's festival; and a \$20,000 supplementary grant to Les Jeunes Musicales du Canada.

## Flood Water Spills Over Area In U.S.

CHICAGO (AP) — Destructive flood waters spilled over widespread areas of the mid-western United States Thursday. Thousands of persons sought shelter as their homes were filled with water.

Two persons were killed Wednesday in a south Minnesota rain storm and two children were missing after they were seen playing near the swollen Battle Creek River in Minnesota's Ramsey county.

An estimated 1,000 persons have been forced from their homes in several Iowa areas. Dozens of communities were in danger of the creeping, rolling waters.

Officials said flood damage in Cherokee, a town of 8,500 in northwestern Iowa, could exceed \$2,000,000.

Northeastern Iowa battled the rampaging Cedar River. Central Iowa was hard pressed to hold back the Des Moines River.

An estimated 100 homes were evacuated in southwestern Iowa.

The Red Cross said it was caring for 135 persons in shelters in Cherokee, Webster City, Marshalltown and Waterloo, and for 346 flood victims in several other cities.

## New Provincial Power Said Weakening Gov't

The importance of a strong central government for Canada was emphasized last night by Rev. Dr. F. W. P. Bolger, who addressed a meeting of the Charlottetown Kinmen Club.

Father Bolger said the federal government was being weakened by giving more power to the provinces. He said the country could not exist as a nation without a strong central government.

The central government must remain supreme, he stressed, regardless of what any individual province or locality may demand.

Father Bolger reviewed the history of the Canadian government from 1834 to the present and dealt with the stability of Canadian unity under various prime ministers.

## Can Types Of Future Are Shown At Session

Demonstrations of cans, and methods of canning and inspection were featured at yesterday's sessions of the short canning course in the National Film Board Library.

Two projected developments for the future of the canning industry, "Easy-Open" cans and ones made of CR2, a lighter but tougher tin plate, were shown by Jack Roser, Hamilton, Ont., a representative of an internationally-known canning company.

The "Easy-Open" tin can be opened without a can opener. It has a tab which can be lifted with the fingers and manipulated to strip the top open. One of the problems to be overcome is that of being able to withstand rough treatment it may receive in transit.

The "CR2" cans, while available for demonstration are said to be a future project so far as

manufacture—for commercial purposes is concerned.

### CRAB MEAT

It was noted that the canning of crab meat is a rapidly expanding part of the industry in the Maritimes. Paturel packed 3,000 cases at Shediac last year and extensive canning of crab meat was done on the island at Mont Carmel and Gaspereau. One island plant has been processing crab meat on a limited scale for the last 10 to 12 years. Discussing the crab meat possibilities and advising on the techniques at the current course was Kenneth Swansburg, officer-in-charge, fish inspection laboratory at Shediac, New Brunswick.

Crabs are more difficult than lobsters to maintain in a live condition. They must be kept right side up, otherwise they die rapidly, Mr. Swansburg explained.

Like lobsters, they must be kept in moist surroundings so the gills will not dry out, it was emphasized.

The four-day short course ends Friday at noon. William A. Murphy, officer-in-charge, fish inspection laboratory at Charlottetown, is presiding.

sold in restaurants, hotels and motels raised to six from five per cent and extended to food prepared for outside delivery, effective May 1. It would apply to meals costing more than \$1.24, rather than the previous 90-cent minimum.

5. A new six-per-cent tax on hotel and motel room rentals effective May 1. To free laborers and students from this tax, the government would exempt rooms rented for one month or more, except in resorts.

6. A new six-per-cent tax on long-distance telephone calls, telegrams, teletype services and other means of telecommunication, effective May 1. Local calls already are subject to the six-per-cent tax. "We don't see any particular reason to exempt the telecommunication service, even more so because they are chiefly used by business or better-off persons," Mr. Lesage said.

## BECOMES INCORPORATED

Early last fall, the Students' Union was incorporated, thus becoming the first student organization in the Atlantic Provinces, and only the seventh in Canada to take such action. This incorporation was necessitated by the construction of an \$80,000 Coffee Shop on campus.

## Lloyd MacInnis Award Fund Is Established

A Maritime Provinces award for outstanding achievement in the fields of community and human relations is to be established in the name of a Halifax broadcaster who died recently.

To be known as the Lloyd MacInnis Memorial Award, it will be presented annually to an individual or group selected for a distinctive contribution in one of the many fields of activity in which Mr. MacInnis interested himself during his years as a broadcaster in the Maritimes.

Details of the award were announced recently by S.R. Kennedy, president of the newly formed award fund and by Dr. Manuel I. Zive, chairman of the board of trustees for the Maritime School of Social Work.

It was stated that the award was established in response to many letters and suggestions received by the family and friends of the late Mr. MacInnis.

The Maritime School of Social Work has agreed to handle the administrative details and the Royal Bank of Canada has volunteered to accept contributions to the fund at any of its Maritime branches.

Recipients of the award will be given a sum of money along with a formal citation and plaque which will be visible evidence of the honor. The award is to be presented at a formal dinner to be held annually in the early spring.

## Final Planning Is Underway For 'Y' Circus

## Evidence Hints Drugs Smuggled Inside Books

MONTREAL (CP) — Evidence that heroin may have been flown to Montreal hidden in books was heard Thursday at the opening of preliminary hearing of five men charged in connection with a huge drug seizure two weeks ago.

The five were arrested after the RCMP seized 61.6 pounds of heroin with an underworld value ranging from \$25,000,000 to \$40,000,000. Four are employees of Air France. The fifth is a Montreal trucker who came here from his native France 10 years ago.

They are Roland Delecotte, 28, the trucker; Georges Aubert, 49; Roger Loiseleur; Philippe Borel, 26; and Emile Serafin, 35.

Loiseleur is charged with possession of narcotics for purposes of trafficking. The other four are charged additionally with conspiracy to traffic in narcotics.

Const. Gilles Poissant testified he found four kilos (8 1/2 pounds) of heroin in eight plastic bags when the RCMP raided Loiseleur's hotel room March 24.

Aubert, the first witness as the Crown proceeded against Serafin, testified he knew all

the accused as well as two other men whom he identified as Pierre Gros and Henri Laporterie. The latter two were arrested in France in connection with the case.

Aubert, the airline purser, told of a meeting in a French restaurant prior to March 13 when Laporterie "asked me to do a favor for him and bring a dozen books to Montreal."

"We are continually being solicited like this. I had no reason to think the package contained other than books," Aubert said.

The hearing continues.
