THE UNDERLYING MOTIVE

SIR.—The refusal of the United States Senate to ratify the arbitration treaty, is now a thing of the past, but I think that Canadians fail to appreciate the underlying motive which led to that rejection.

It is unquestionably an intense hatred to England and to every thing British. Mr. Chancey Depew, in an interview a short time ago, said that war between the United States and England is inevitable, caused by the intense hostility of a majority of the American people to the mother country, an hostility which he admitted was not shared by the English.

An English gentleman who has spent the last seven years in travelling through the United States and spending much time in its principal cities, writes to a leading London newspaper:—

"With every wish to do justice to Mr. Bayard, whose friendly feelings towards England, so nobly expressed on several occasions, deserve warm recognition, I, nevertheless, fear that they are calculated to mislead English people, if they are taken to represent the real feelings of the American people generally. I have seen so many bitter attacks on England in numerous organs of public opinion in the various parts of the United States which I have visited, and so very few of a friendly character, that I am reluctantly driven to the conclusion that a war with England would be popular with the great mass of the American people (especially in the Western States) and that they are well pleased with the way in which the Senate has dealt with the arbitration treaty.

Not long since the Sun, which is the organ of the Democratic warlike party in New York, concluded a bitter attack on England with the following lines:—

"She hath scourged the seas as a spoiler Her mart is the robbers den; With the wretched toil of the toiler And the bartered souls of men, She hath scourged the weak and the lowly And the just with an iron rod She is drunk with the blood of the Holy She shall drink of the wrath of God."

It is useless to say that these sentiments are merely the opinions of the proprietor of the Sun. His paper gives expression to these opinions because they are popular, and it pays.

The American people do not desire peace with England. It is to be regretted that they do not; but unfortunately it is but too true.

AT THE OPERA HOUSE.

Mr. W. S. Harkin's company had a very good house on Saturday night, when they presented "The Bowery Girl." The play, as the name indicates, deals with life in and about New York's well-known thoroughfare, and was therefore of a different character and a lighter vein than those which preceded it. The plot, however, is interesting, and the various characters were cleverly taken. Miss Mamie Ryan, as the Bowery belle, showed her versatility as the character was entirely different from those which she assumed at the other performances. Miss Dunn took the part of another child of the Bowery, one of the Chimnie Fadden type, and did it well. Mr. Beresford, as "Swipesy" was the real Bowery product, and gave a splendid impersonation. Mr. Wise, as the candidate for aldermanic honors in de Fort ward, was all that the character demanded. His speech to his fellow democrats was very laughable. During the play a roof garden concert was introduced, and the Misses Ryan and Dunn gave songs and dances and Mr. and Mrs. French banjo selections. The dynamite explosion in the third act was very realistic.

The company will remain in Charlottetown until Wednesday morning, when they leave for Moncton where they play a return engagement. In response to repeated requests Mr. Harkin has kindly consented to repeat "The New Boy" on Tuesday night. This funniest of all comedies was played at the matinee on Saturday afternoon, and the large audience was kept laughing throughout the entire performance. Mr. Wise as "The New Boy" is too funny for anything. No one should miss seeing him dressed as a boy of 14 years, in knickerbockers, short jacket, etc. Mr. Deyo, Miss Cleveland, Miss Ryan, Miss Dunn and the others of the company all have good parts in the play, which should draw a full house. BEAUTIFUL JUBILEE MEDAL.

Doctor Hodgson, Master of the Rolls, has obtained a very beautiful jubilee medal to be presented to each of the scholars of St. Peter's School. On the obverse there is a bust of the Queen and the words, "Victoria, Queen and Empress." On the reverse there are the Royal Arms of England, and the Arms of Canada beneath the Imperial Crown, with the monogram "V. R. I." and the words "Dominion of Canada, The Rt Hon. Earl of Aberdeen, Governor-General." The medal is of white metal, heavily plated with silver and will be attached by means of a ribbon and clasp, on the latter of which are inscribed the words, "God Save the Queen." It is an artistic and fitting souvenir of Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee.
