Gleanings.

A Naturalization Act has been introduced in the Japanese Diet. If passed it will come into operation on January 1, 1893. The qualifications for naturalization are as follows:—The applicant must be of age and have the control of his property according to the laws of his native country. He must be of good morality. He must be capable of earning his livelihood. He must have continuously resided in Japan for not less than ten years prior to his application, and two years' notice of the application must be given. If he is desirous of omitting the last two requirements, he must show either that he has performed some meritorious work for the country, or that he is in the Government employ, and this includes those who have assisted native invention, agriculture, commerce, industries, or sciences. A naturalized subject is debarred from the offices of Minister of State, Privy Councillor, Admiral and Field Marshal, but if he has been ten years naturalized, and has obtained the confidence of any constituency, he may become an M. P.

Poor, poor, little Queen of Holland! Everyone says what a nice little girl she is, and how admirably she is being brought up by her mother; but such an unchildlike life seems to my notice particularly sad. It is against the strict etiquette of the Dutch Court for the future Queen to be allowed to play with other little boys and girls, and so she grows up practically alone. Whether or not the story which is told of her is a true one, it is assuredly very pathetic, and shows that the intelligent child recognizes that her position is not by any means all pleasure. She was only about six or seven years of age when she was one day overheard playing with her dolls. One was a baby misadventured itself in some way, and the small mother, holding up a warning finger, said sternly, "If you are so naughty I shall make you into a Princess, and then you won't have any other little children to play with, and you'll always have to throw kisses with your hands whenever you go out driving." Although only eleven years of age, Princess Wilhelmine already speaks French and English fluently, and her governess, Miss Winter, is an Englishwoman. Of course she knows nothing, as it was her father's wish that she should not be taught the language, he was so prejudiced against everything German. This child must have regretted when the little Princess came with the Empress of Germany to see her last year. But even without language she would have been a find a great deal to interest them in each other. The Prince Wilhelmine has a garden of her own, in which no one is allowed to work but herself, and her great pets are some doves.

The fashion of seating dinner parties at small tables, introduced one or two seasons ago, is fading away in New York. Hostesses who entertain from twenty to thirty guests at a dinner have discovered that much better social results are secured by this arrangement, and a prettier effect given to the room. It must, however, require considerable care and a talent for nice adjustment to properly group small parties. Lately an intrepid hostess, giving a dinner to a company of thirty, put them at six tables—five at each. At some there were necessarily three women to two men, and at others the situation was reversed. How to combine these uneven groups to preserve an average equilibrium at every table indicated wisdom to which none must bow.

I am afraid that the women reformers of Victoria have more zeal than discretion. They seem to have a faculty of overdoing whatever they undertake, even if it be only the talking of slang. But when they come to matters which they think need reformation, they are simply furious in their enthusiasm. For instance, lately a convention of the Woman's Temperance Union was held at Melbourne. Considering the amount of misery produced in the world by drink, one would almost have fancied that to educate the universe in temperance would have been as much as the Victorian matrons and maids could have undertaken. But, on dear, no! they reckon that only the beginning of their labors—their stand point from which to work. At their recent meeting they soon got rid of the temperance question, and went on to the extension of the Parliamentary suffrage to women. Then came a denunciation of the practice of attending concerts, &c., "scandalously attended," and last of all, a protest against the type of womanhood depicted in the advertisements of tobacconists. The last is just about one of the most foolish protests I have read for some time. It may not be pleasant for the feminine eye to see beautiful woman represented as an overblown female with golden hair, coal-black eyes, rights, and a certain vagueness as to the rest of her attire, but neither can it be all that is delightful for politicians to see themselves caricatured in every manner, and under every guise possible; but whoever heard of Mr Gladstone or Lord Salisbury objecting? No, I am afraid that the women who band themselves together to agitate against such a trivial cause of complaint as this, prove their unfitness at once to undertake more serious duties which would fall to their lot as members of Parliament, and it does not argue much for the probability of using their power of voting intelligently. Why, they would return a man to office at once if he would promise to have all female advertisement figures clad in tea-gowns of sombre hue.

News Notes.

Halifax wants a \$100,000 drill shed. Steps are being taken in Berlin for the relief of the unemployed.

The foot and mouth disease has been discovered among cattle in Edinburgh.

The effect of the M. K. Key law on Austria's trade has thrown 20,000 pearl workers in Vienna out of employment.

The Government of Paltava, Russia, has been dismissed because he failed to suppress Nihilism in his district.

A coffin supposed to contain a corpse was taken into California from Mexico. Upon examination it was found to contain opium.

The millionaires of the neighboring republic are making magnificent gifts for the endowment of universities, the establishment of free libraries and other educational purposes. The great school which Mr. Drexel equipped in Philadelphia the other day will be a monument to his intellectual liberality. Mr. Stanford has established a university in California. Mr. Rockefeller's gifts to the University of Chicago now reaches the total of \$2,000,000.

A new way of making it hard to prosecute those who sell liquor illegally has been devised in New Brunswick. One Compton has been found \$50 by two justices at Fairville for tempting a liquor dealer to break the law. There are, of course, times when it may be an injustice to punish a man for illegally selling liquor; but they are few and far between among the many occasions when the law is notoriously broken. But the punishment in this case will strike the average mind as out of proportion to the gravity of the sin. The auditor is the standing invitation to lead the man behind it into temptation.

The old broad gauge will soon have disappeared from the British railway system. In the year 1845 it was enacted that 4 feet 8 1/2 inches should be the rule for Great Britain and 5 feet 2 inches for Ireland—the only exception permitted being a gauge of 7 feet in the Great Western, and connected railways in Middlesex, Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Cornwall, Devon, Dorset, and Somerset, as well as the old Oxford, Worcester and Wolverhampton line and its branches. In the course of time, the narrow gauge has carried the day almost everywhere, and in May next the last remnant of the seven feet gauge will disappear. The Great Western Company have made the announcement that the conversion of the lines in the west of England from broad to narrow gauge will be inaugurated on the 20th of May next.
