**PREFERENTIAL TRADE.**

SIR CHARLES TUPPER has submitted a resolution to the House of Commons, declaring—

"That this House is of opinion that a system of mutual trade preference between Great Britain and Ireland and the colonies would greatly stimulate increased production in trade and commerce between these countries, and would thus promote and maintain the unity of the Empire, and that nothing which falls short of the complete realization of such a policy should be considered as final and satisfactory."

Before the last election, Sir Wilfrid Laurier professed to be strongly in favor of the policy here set forth. It is a policy the success of which means millions to Canada and its success is worth while striving for. In 1896, Sir Wilfrid said the possibilities of its realization were immense. What will he say now?

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

—Mr. Macrum has gained no credit in the States for running away from his duty at Pretoria; and his excuses and explanations "don't cut ice," "worth a cent."

—Three hundred and twenty thousand seals is the reported result of this spring's hunt off Newfoundland. At \$2.00 each these will bring a pretty penny into "Ye Ancient Colony."

—President Kruger never contemplated that four or five thousand of his Boers would be sent to St. Helena, and the fact has come upon him as a displeasing surprise. But St. Helena is after all a much better place than the great Karoo.

—The Canadian Home Journal continues to be true to name. The number for April is exceedingly interesting particularly for the ladies, and the illustrations are capital. Several fine half-tone pictures of Lady Minto and her children are features in the April number.

—The Senate's rejection of the Liberal Gerrymander excites little remark or interest. Only the strong Liberal papers, like The Guardian and Montreal Witness, condemn it. The Montreal Gazette aptly remarks that "With the Yukon, the Crow's Nest and Drummond County deals on record, the people are rather inclined to think the killing of a Laurier Government proposal must be a good thing."

—Most of the Liberal organs throughout Canada condemn the Senate upon the same grounds as our astute and independent Guardian, "the Senators are old," etc. The Senators are, at all events, young enough to see that the Liberal gerrymander was unfair and not for the good of the country, and wise enough to "let the people judge for themselves," whether the Liberal gerrymander or Sir Charles Tupper's judicial scheme should be adopted.

**A NEW PROGRAMME.**

THE Laurier Government is going to the country with a new programme.

1. High expenditures—\$10,688,000 of an increase.
2. High debt—\$7,500,000 of an increase.
3. High taxes—\$12,400,000 of an increase.
4. Trade for the United States—\$35,000,000 of increased imports from that country.
5. No market for Canada in the United States.
6. No preference for Canadian products in the British market.
7. Canadian industry to be gradually squeezed by tariff process.
8. Railway subsidies increased from \$3,200 to \$6,400 a mile.
9. Profitable deals for favoured friends.
10. Gerrymanders by politicians at any time instead of redistribution by judges every decade.
11. Down with the Senate, because it stands by the people.
12. "Why fight for England?" unless forced by a public opinion which says "act or get out."
13. Racial hatred.
14. No closer union with the Empire.—Mail and Empire.
