Home Promises To Seek Improved Soviet Relations

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Lord Home said Monday he is inflexibly opposed to communion as long as its program includes the use of force but he also pledged to do everything in his power to improve relations with the Soviet Union. The new prime minister underfunds three election appearances in a single night, apparently in a move to get his face and program before the British public which tends to look on him as an aristocratic and somewhat remote figure. The peer-prime minister confirmed that he will renounce his title this week if legal formalities can be completed that fast.

Home made his comments on communism in one of his TV news casts in a telegram to Premier Khrushchev. Earlier in the day he had appointed former labor minister John Hare to head the Conservative party and prepare it for an election bid next week. Home's telegram to the Kremlin was in reply to communications Khrushchev sent him. He said he "is fully determined to do everything in his power to improve relations between the two countries in the interests of world peace."

Home, who succeeded Harold Macmillan Saturday as a com-

promise candidate after a bitter party struggle for power, reached out to Macmillan's old team Monday for one government appointment. Macmillan's son, Maurice, will have the honor of representing his father at the annual dinner of the Conservative party. Hare, who served as colonial, war and agriculture secretary in the last decade, got the honorary title of chancellor of the duchy of Lancaster, giving him a seat in the cabinet. He is 52. Lord Poole stays on as deputy party chairman after backing Lord Halifax in the power struggle.

Home has the prerogative of naming his own men to those jobs, as well as to all government posts. Unlike the opposition party, the Conservatives do not elect their leaders or prospective cabinet ministers. They are "elected" through negotiation and discussion. This Home was free to choose Maurice Macmillan, his old chief, for a post as economic secretary to the treasury. Maurice, 47, is a taxation specialist and MP.

Bank Manager Pleads Guilty

HALIFAX (CP) — James C. Pope, 84-year-old former manager of a Royal Bank of Canada branch at suburban Armidale, pleaded guilty in city police court Monday to theft of money from the bank. Assistant Crown prosecutor George T. Harahan said about \$17,000 was involved.

Pope was arraigned after the regular court session was over and Magistrate E. D. Murray set bail at \$6,000. A few minutes later, Pope reappeared and pleaded guilty to the charge, which specified the theft of money in excess of \$50.

His case was continued until Friday for sentencing.

Youth Remanded In Murder Case

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — David Joseph Morneau, 16, of Saint John, was remanded until Oct. 24 after being charged here Monday with the capital murder of Eugene Denise whose body was found in a bush near here three months ago.

The youth, a native of Montreal, entered on plea in police court.

The badly decomposed body of Denise—also known as Eugene Dennis—was found in bushes in neighboring Simmonds parish July 12 and identified by a fingerprint which matched one taken in 1946. His age was not known.

A incest jury was unable to determine the cause of death and returned a verdict to that one. Part of a human arm dragged onto a lawn led to discovery of the body.
