Athletics End Support Of Farm Team At Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP)—Ottawa's future in International League baseball appears non-existent following withdrawal of Philadelphia Athletics' support of their farm club here.

The parent organization, whose American League position still is unsettled in an on-again-off-again sale dispute, pulled out of Ottawa Tuesday.

The decision was announced in a letter to T. P. (Tommy) Gorman who holds a lease on city-owned Lansdowne Park, the Ottawa Athletics' home grounds, for International League baseball. Gorman did not disclose whether the letter, signed by Channing Elery, a lawyer for the Philadelphia club, gave any reason for pulling up stakes here, but it is known the parent club was dissatisfied with Ottawa attendance figures.

MAY MOVE FRANCHISE
It was not made clear whether Philadelphia abandoned its franchise, or whether it will ask the International League to switch the franchise to some other city.

Gorman said he has a 30-day option on the Ottawa franchise, but he has not decided whether to exercise or drop it.

We read an article recently in a current sports periodical which expressed our sentiments regarding managers of big league baseball teams. The title of it was "Managers are a dime a dozen." In our opinion that title just about sums it up. It's possible you might get only eleven Durochers for a dime, and a ten cent piece might bring in thirteen Lopezes, but that little difference is scarcely worth talking about.

Stengel was just another manager for eight years with Brooklyn and Boston, and in none of these years was he able to get his club out of the second division. Then he takes over the Yankees, and suddenly he blossoms into the best manager in the business. In the Yankees he was first night. When he lost this year, he said the genius had lost his touch. Lost his touch, my eye! He had Raschi and Martin, and was dealt with a fading Sain, Rizzuto and Reynolds, and an improved Cleveland club.

The McCarthy also did a brilliant job with the Yankees, and if he hadn't left them and gone to the Red Sox, no one would have found he had feet of clay like all the other managers. Durocher was a team in 1953, and a genius in 1954. How come? Did he get hold of some of Poppe's spinach over the years? No, sir. He got hold of Willie Mays again, and Antonelli, and Dusty Rhodes, and saw his relief pitchers, Wilhelm and Gussion, develop into two of the best in the game.

Managers of baseball clubs in "the sticks" have a much better right to claim credit for their team's victories because there is sometimes a wide spread in their baseball know-how. One manager can and does know a lot more baseball than another. In the big leagues, they all know the book pretty well, and they play pretty much according to the book. If they forsake it and play a hunch and it works, they're geniuses. If it fails, they're bums. That's about all there is to it.

We were happy to see Vance Harris back with the Islanders after a one-game absence. Vance may not get a chance to play regularly, but he should learn something playing with these major leaguers. We think it too bad Ron McArthur and Paul Schumann didn't try on. We feel those boys might also have made the grade. And then Summerside would have had quite a stake in the Islanders. As it is, we think there will be larger crowds from Summerside going to the Forum because young Harris is with the club.

Injury May End Reynolds Pitching Career

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—A slip in the shower last week may cost Allie Reynolds, the New York Yankee Super Chief, the remainder of his pitching career, it was being conjectured Tuesday.

The famous fireballer told the Daily Oklahoman the index finger of his right hand was severely cut in the accident last Thursday at Colorado Springs, Colo.

Reynolds, 37, had returned from deer hunting. While taking a shower the mat slipped, throwing him into the glass enclosure.

A specialist was summoned and soon after performed an 80-minute operation in a Colorado Springs Hospital on the finger which suffered a bone-deep gash. Skin had to be grafted over the cut.

Results of the surgery will not be known until today, Reynolds informed the newspaper.

Moreover to help the spectators, admission charges have been materially cut down, with low-rate admission, larger crowds are required.

We hope we have made it clear what is required. The game of Friday and succeeding days will be your answer. It is your club, we are your servants. Make or break is in your hands.

Sees Alouettes With 50-50 Chance In Playoffs

MONTREAL (CP)—Coach Douglas (Peabody) Walker lifted his gaze from a play diagram Tuesday and said he thinks his Montreal Alouettes have a 50-50 chance against Hamilton Tiger-Cats in the Big Four football playoff.

This could be taken as an under statement since Alouettes have already defeated the Tiger-Cats three times and dropped one game by only a single point. But since then Alouettes have lost Harold Patterson, 22-year-old star from the University of Kansas. Patterson broke his right ankle last Saturday in a game against Toronto Argonauts.

Walker was ready to admit this was a tough blow and that he considers Patterson a top-notch, all-round player. At the same time the coach made it plain that he isn't selling his team short because of the loss of one man.

The playoffs are Walker's immediate concern. Alouettes and Tiger-Cats have already grabbed the playoff spots, although the teams meet here Saturday and Alouettes finish the regular season in Ottawa the following Saturday.

Walker said he is looking no further ahead than the playoffs although he admitted Alouettes will scout the western finals between Winnipeg Blue Bombers and Edmonton Eskimos. "And I imagine Hamilton will scout them, too."

Boxing Official Threatens To Quit

LONDON (AP)—J. Onslow Fane, president of the British Boxing Board of Control, threatened Tuesday to resign from the one-year-old World Boxing Championship Committee because it was ignored in six of seven title bouts held this year.

"If the committee is to be a mockery, I shall withdraw," Fane said. The committee, formed a year ago in Paris, had been consulted only on the Cohen-Songkitt title fight in Thailand, he added, although six other championship fights were held.

Four - Goal Outburst In 3rd Period Turns Tide

FREDERICTON (CP)—A four-goal rally in the last period of a thrilling game behind the able Charlottetown Islanders to trim Fredericton Capitals 5-3 Tuesday night in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League.

Caps remained at the top of the loop with Moncton Hawks only two points off the pace, while Island-

ers rose to a third place tie with Amherst Ramblers, a game behind Moncton.

Doug Hewey scored for Fredericton in the first period and Bob Gray tied it in the second. Gray counted two more in the third, with Copper Leyte and Ray LeDuc rounding out the Charlottetown scoring. Buck Whitlock set up the Island goals.

Gerry Smith and Bessie MacDonald were the third period scorers for Fredericton.

Two majors were imposed in the last stanza, against Lloyd Hinchberger of Charlottetown and aggressive Rheel Grenon of Caps.

The Capitals have led what shows to be the fastest team in the league. The line of Jerry Smith, Bob Leger and Bessie MacDonald are as good as anything that has been seen in the Maritimes in several years. All of this combination are fast skaters, good puck carriers, smooth passers and deadly when it comes to ducking a defence and scoring goals. Nicolle and Bill McDonagh did not dress Monday night. Nick works in Saint John during the day and only plays on Saturday nights and when the Caps are at home.

Veteran Roy "Buck" Whitlock of the Prince Edward Islanders, a familiar figure among leading scorers in Maritime hockey leagues for a number of years, is presently setting the pace in the newly-formed Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League, figures released by Robert Chandler, secretary-treasurer of the circuit, show. Last season Buck finished third in the now defunct Maritime Major League with 114 points and at that missed 24 of the regular games. Buck has captured the Maritime scoring crown four times in his eight seasons of senior play. Colorful Nick Pidosny of the Moncton Hawks is the top net-minder in the circuit. The temperamental chatterbox has been beaten only 18 times in the seven games already played by the Hawks for an average of 2.57.

Big Rheel Grenon, fiery blue-line banger with the Fredericton Capitals, who finished his spats with Lou Kiley in court last season, has made a big start on that short legal road again this year. At present the Fredericton club is protesting the two-game suspension and \$25 fine which was imposed on Rheel as a result of his antics in Moncton last Saturday night. Rheel ran beserk as he threatened to demolish referee Dewar Judson, a policeman and every fan in the rink after he had been handed a major penalty for landing a tremendous haymaker on the jaw of Moncton's Frank Derington. Danky retired to the dressing room with the help of several players. Rheel's suspension and fine were imposed by league president Babbit Parlee. Coach Dugger McNeil of the Hawks was fined \$5 for his verbal battle with referee Close Bishop in Fredericton on October 26. Lou Kiley of the Ramblers was fined \$5 for using abusive language in an argument with Cliff Young while Larry Blackburn is short \$25 for striking the same man in Fredericton on October 28. Incidentally, Cliff Young is the referee-in-chief that visited Charlottetown with the Caps on Monday night.

The fans didn't have much praise for the referees in Monday's game when they failed to give the Caps a penalty when Palladino received several deep facial cuts and a broken nose from the high flying stick of forward Clow Hewey. It seems that everybody in the rink except the referees saw the infraction. In regard to such an infraction, the official rule book of the CAHA states, and we quote, that "when a player carries or holds any part of his stick above the height of his shoulder so that injury to the face or head of an opponent results, the referee shall have no alternative but to impose a major penalty on the offending player."

Summer Tan In Serious Condition

NEW YORK (AP)—Mrs. Russell A. Firestone's Summer Tan, winner of the world's richest horse race and a leading candidate for the Kentucky Derby and other three-year-old classics next year, was in a serious condition at Belmont Park Tuesday and his racing future was uncertain.

The two-year-old colt, winner of the \$269,965 Garden State last Saturday, is suffering from an embolism blood clot in the artery supplying the large intestine. He was stricken after being transported from Garden State Park, where he ran his last race of the 1954 season, to Belmont, where he was to remain until time to go to Florida for winter racing.

Navy League Scholarships

TORONTO (CP)—The Navy League of Canada announced Tuesday it will sponsor 60 university scholarships for Royal Canadian Sea Cadets next year.

The league has awarded about 30 scholarships each year since the Second World War, spokesman said. The increase, for one year only, will mark the organization's diamond jubilee observance.

The league said terms of the scholarships will be announced later.

C. Kirkland McLeod, Montreal industrialist, was re-elected national president at the league's annual convention. It is his third successive term.

Vice-presidents elected included: Capt. F. A. Price, Quebec City, and Cmdr. H. Garrett, St. John's, Nfld.

The league approved extension of Royal Canadian Sea Cadet corps training for boys and reported increased use of the league's recreation and accommodation facilities for seamen in Maritimes ports.

Members unanimously approved a resolution calling for a Canadian-owned, Canadian-manned merchant fleet.

Mickey Mantle Has Checkup On Knee

NEW YORK (AP)—Mickey Mantle, New York Yankees long-hitting outfielder, has undergone another checkup on his injured knee and received a clean bill of health, the Yankee management said Tuesday.

Mantle, who injured a cartilage in his right knee during the
