

Stabbing Case Hearing Opens In Police Court

Two crown witnesses were heard yesterday in the trial of Milton Ernest Benoit, Charlottetown, charged before Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court with assaulting Adrian Baglole, Charlottetown, causing actual bodily harm.

Following the testimony, the accused, counselled by John P. Nicholson, was remanded until June 8. The case for the crown is being conducted by Alan K. Scates.

DOCTOR TESTIFIES
Dr. Leo Killorn described being called to the Charlottetown Hospital about 11.30 on the night of May 1, where he examined Baglole.

From his examination, he found that the injured man had sustained a laceration above the left eye, and that he was gasping with pain with a weak breath. After Baglole had removed his shirt, the doctor said he discovered a stab wound in the left side of the chest.

The wound was in the sixth rib space, and at first did not appear to have penetrated the chest cavity. When about to strap the chest of patient, the witness said that the man suddenly turned ashen and fell over.

Examination at this point failed to detect any heart action, and the doctor said that he thought he might be dead. External heart massage was applied, and in about one or two

minutes the victim's heart was re-activated.
PUNCTURE INDICATED
Two hours later, the victim still complained of pain when breathing and breathing sounds in the region of the bottom of the left lung faded. This was found to be due to slow inward bleeding indicating a slight puncture of the chest cavity.

Shown a pointed hunting knife the doctor said that the weapon, or any other knife similarly pointed, could have caused the wound.

Cross-examined by Mr. Nicholson, the witness said that he had no indication that Baglole had been stabbed in the chest until the shirt was removed, as the patient had made no mention of such a wound.

Adrian Baglole, victim of the alleged assault, stated that on the night of May 1 he was drinking at the Legion in company with Ray Moore and a Mr. MacRae. They left the building about 11:15 and proceeded to a house on Richmond Street, adjacent to Connaught Square.

REMAINED OUTSIDE
When the three men arrived there Baglole said that Moore went inside, and that he and MacRae stayed outside for a few minutes, and then walked south across the square to Union Street, with the intention of going home.

On the way across, he said he looked back and saw Moore and Benoit were outside the McCarty home, so he and MacRae walked back across the square to them.

The men met on the square about 25 or 30 feet from the street, and Baglole said Benoit came up to him and said, "I hear you are out to get me" which the witness said he denied.

Baglole said that he had asked Benoit what he had in his hand behind his back, and he didn't answer. He stated that he discovered that Benoit had a knife in his hand when he cut the witness above the left eye.

FELT WOUND IN CHEST
He stated he did not see the knife after being cut in the forehead, but had felt a something in the left side of his chest. Following this, Baglole said Moore grabbed Benoit and took the knife away. Benoit left the scene about five or ten minutes after the incident, he said. Shows the knife which had previously been shown to the first witness, Baglole said that the knife he had seen at the

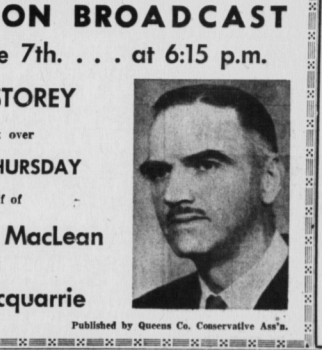
