IS RETURNING FROM CHINA MISSION FIELD

Rev. Vincent Morrison Writes Enthusiastically Of Progress Made During Past Decade.

Many friends and acquaintances will be interested to learn of the anticipated early return to his native Province for rest and recuperation after eleven years service at the Catholic mission, Lishui, Chekiang, China, of the Rev. Vincent Morrison, Father Morrison, expects to leave Shanghai for Canada about the first week in May, in a letter to The Guardian, to which newspaper he has subscribed regularly during his long absence abroad, he writes:

"It was on December 13th, 1925, that I left Canada in company with Rev. Father Fraser, our superior, and arrived here in Lishui in January of the following year. Since then missionaries from Canada have been coming every year and with this year's band will bring the number up to twenty six, all members of the China Mission Seminary at Scarborough Bluffs, Ontario.

"During the past ten years Lishui has made great progress from a spiritual point of view. New parishes with resident priests have been opened up, and a large number of converts from Paganism are recorded. Schools and dispensaries have been established in which pagan children as well as Christian are taught and treated for all manner of diseases.

"When I look back on the decade of years just past, I marvel at the changes which have taken place in a material way. The first was the installation of telephone service and the introduction of a few rickshaws into the city. Now nearly every big store in town has a telephone and receives and delivers orders by telephone. There are now over one hundred rickshaws in the city all doing good business. The construction of highways with bus service connecting the principal cities has opened and increased communications tenfold. I can now go from here (Lishui) to Shanghai in one day, when formerly it took me ten days, and that only if I made good connections.

"I shall be glad indeed to return to the land of my birth at Savage Harbor, P.E.I. and to visit with you and to tell you what a wonderful country is China and what a wonderful people and civilization she possesses."
