South Africa and the East.

BRITAIN RULES THE WAVES.

Those who claim to read the journalistic signs of the times say that so soon as the war in South Africa dies down we are to hear more of England's danger from invasion. The speeches of Lord Salisbury and Lord Rosebery will give the journalists all the text they need, and for material they have only to turn to the series of volumes being published in Paris under the historical section of the general staff of the French army. These volumes are three in number and present complete studies of the French plans of invasion of the British Isles. In the first volume, just published, Captain Desbriere shows by an ingenious tracking of meteorological curves that the expedition of 1796 to 1798 only failed because the French admiral refused to wait a day or two longer for a storm to lift before returning to Brest. The second volume will treat of the expeditions subsequent to 1797, while the third will be devoted to Napoleon's extensive preparations at Boulogne. It is not pleasant to think of the possible effect of these publications upon Frenchmen after a financially disastrous exhibition, and upon jingoistic Englishmen under the lashing of sensational journalists. Happily England is not wholly given over to jingoism, or France to nationalism. However, should France so far forget herself that she will attempt to take Great Britain, her death knell would be sounded as soon as war was declared. England's strength on land and sea is today greater than ever before. Her thundering battleships would destroy France's seaports and navy before she would be able to strike.

SEYMOUR EXPLAINS.

The Daily Express prints recently a long letter said to have been written by Vice Admiral Seymour, in which he stoutly defends his action in advancing to the relief of the legations. Among other things, Admiral Seymour is said to have written:—

"Two or three times our prospects were very dark and disaster seemed probable, yet I never regretted that I had started as I could not have respected myself if I had not done so."

Referring to the difficulties of controlling mixed troops, and to their characteristics, he said:—

"The Germans were admired most; but for dash and go none surpassed or perhaps equalled the Americans. The French had no particular rapprochement with any other nationality. The Germans and Russians were inclined to hold together; but the Americans were with us always."

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Mayor Eybert, returning to Paris from the Transvaal, appeals to the Boer Independence Committee to succor the many Frenchmen now ragged and destitute at Lorenzo Marques. He has induced the French Government to ship them back to France, but they will arrive penniless, and he urges their being supplied on landing with clothes and travelling expenses, for they have reflected honor on the French name, and their heroism has seconded the Boers in their marvelous resistance.

OTTER'S INSTRUCTIONS

Will Likely be Advised to Reattest the Canadians.

OTTAWA, Aug. 23.—The term of service for the first contingent will terminate in October, and in reply to Colonel Otter's request for instructions he will doubtless be advised to reattest the men for further short term in the field, should they be required. In official circles it is not considered that any of the men, much as their friends would like to see them in Canada again will ask for their discharge, although they would be entitled to it. There is just a possibility that the regiment will be ordered home before October.

London Empire: Smart society in London is somewhat mixed these days.
