



Still seeking a victory after three starts that saw them wind up on the short end of the score, Eastern Stars ball team meet the second place West End Anchors at the Park diamond tonight in an encounter that is scheduled to start at 8 o'clock sharp.

Lack of hitting plus disastrous errors in the clutches has been the main reason for the three setbacks the Stars have suffered. In each game they have had one bad inning and that has meant the difference between victory and defeat in a team that on paper looks to be on a par with any in the league.

Stars fans are hoping for a change for the better tonight. Daily practice sessions have been gradually pointing out the flaws that have been all too apparent and the team went through their best workout of the year last night, a practice session that saw the squad show far more pep and hustle than has been their custom in the three games they have played.

If Rovers continue getting this brand of hurling and show as smart defensively in their remaining games, they are going to be hard to head off and might lead at that, but the remaining two teams are still to be reckoned with.

With the Stars bound to improve and the Anchors having the best pitching staff in the league, competition promises to be very much keener before the schedule is many days older. Both Stars and Anchors are after the Rovers' scalp and team managers are holding daily workouts in a mighty effort to have their squads hit the peak of their form in short order.

## Horseman Bemoans Trotters' Exodus

(By The Canadian Press) SYDNEY, N.S.W., June 19—The government was standing by and allowing the State to lose a valuable type of horse, the trotter, said James McMahon, president of the Horse Association of New South Wales, at the annual meeting.

Trotters were receiving such scant consideration in New South Wales, Mr. McMahon said, that they were now migrating to South Australia, Western Australia, and even New Zealand where there were more opportunities for such horses.

A few years ago, New South Wales enjoyed a lucrative trade with India, in the sale of what was known as the "Wales" type of horse. Unfortunately that trade had been allowed to disappear, and South America was now benefitting from the mistake of New South Wales, Mr. McMahon said.

## Yankees Lengthen Lead By Defeating Tigers 8-5; N.L. Games Cancelled

NEW YORK, June 19—Oral Hildebrand limited Detroit Tigers to six hits—three of them home runs—as the world champions took the series from the invaders in an 8-5 American League baseball victory today.

The Yankees made five of their runs in the first inning off Paul Trout, and pecked up one each in the fifth, seventh and eighth—the last two coming on homers by Bill Dickey and Red Rolfe.

The Tigers out-homered the champs with Barney McCosky, Pinky Higgins and Red Kress, who was backing Archie McKain, connecting McCosky's homer came in the sixth and was the first hit the Tigers had off Hildebrand.

The victory increased the Yankees' lead to 11 games. Vernon Kennedy scattered six hits over 14 innings to help St. Louis beat Washington Senators 2-1 in the first game of a twin bill, but the Browns lost an abbreviated "lightcap 6-1.

## Hall Defeats Robinson In Tennis Play

WINDSOR, Ont., June 19—(CP)—Blond Bruce Hall of Toronto, latest hot contender for a place on the Canadian Davis Cup team, took another step along the way today by lambasting George Robinson of Montreal in the second round of the Canadian Tennis Championships.

Without an apparent flaw in his game, the University of Toronto theology student set down Robinson 6-3, 6-1 as easily as in the Montrealer was not regarded in his class. Last year Robinson eliminated Hall in the Quebec Championships.

That was the major development in the drive towards positions on the cup team which goes to Cuba next month, to be chosen from showings in the Ontario, Canadian and Quebec tournaments. Last week Hall eliminated Lewis Duff, the defending champion, from the Ontario meet.

But the day's one big upset was reserved for tennis's competition. Mrs. Helen Detwiler of Detroit, a former U. S. national indoor girls champion, whipped the new Ontario tillicat, Mrs. Frank Fisher of Toronto, 6-4, 6-4, in a stunning but deserved victory.

## Tennis Expenses Sharply Checked

LONDON, June 19—Appointment by the Lawn Tennis Association of a playing expenses committee to investigate accounts of open tournaments and alleged breaches of the association's rules as a new move against "shamateurism."

It will recommend action for particular cases and this may involve outright refusal to sanction tournaments, suspension of players or even the loss of amateur status.

The committee has already emphasized that, unless specially authorized, it will be looked upon as a breach of rules for a British player to receive expenses when playing in a tournament abroad, even though the rules of the association of the tournament country may permit it.

Similarly a Dominion or foreign national playing in a tournament in this country is not permitted to receive expenses unless authorized. The Committee points out the expression "hospitality at a private house" cannot, as has been the case so often in the past, cover free board and lodging at an hotel, boarding house, or other similar establishment. It was in this connection that several leading English players were recently warned.

From now on players in tournaments at home or abroad will not be permitted to receive travelling expenses or free rail, air or steamship tickets, although they may receive free transport by car. "In no circumstances," says the Committee, "may prize vouchers be used in payment of entrance fees."

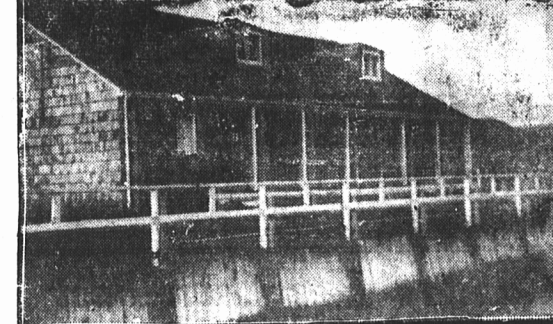
