

# Attraction Neglected Says Prince Fish Game

SUMMERSIDE — One of the biggest tourist attractions in the province is being grossly neglected, stated Lowell W. Hancock, a long time member of the East Prince Fish and Game Association at the annual meeting Wednesday evening, held in the town of Summerside.

Mr. Hancock was referring to trout fishing conditions in the province and especially to the streams and ponds that are filling up with silt and debris. He said practically nothing is being done to correct this situation, except by the fish and game associations, which receive very little money and consequently cannot do the job properly.

Mr. Hancock stated the East Prince branch received \$500 from the department of industry and natural resources last year but with \$500? He said millions are being spent on parks, roads and other things for tourists and at the same time practically nothing on stream improvement.

NEEDS HELP  
Mr. Hancock said trout fishing is now a major attraction that seven out of 10 tourists spend some time fishing while in the province. He said the government will have to wake up to the fact and back stream improvement projects in connection with fish and game associations, whose members

would work in an advisory capacity as they are familiar with the problems involved. He suggested the government employ a biologist to work with a committee from each association to set up a co-ordinated program for stream improvement and other projects. He said this work has to be done in a business-like manner with hired foremen and crews, and not done, as in the past, by a few volunteer members from fish and game associations.

Mr. Hancock stressed that more officers should be necessary as one officer couldn't handle a whole county. Consequently there is but one officer for the entire province and he suggested there should be three wardens for each county.

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## Tom Johnston Baseball Reaches Out For Season

MONTREAL (CP)—Defenceman Tom Johnston of Montreal Canadiens was operated on Thursday for a fractured left cheekbone suffered in practice earlier in the day.

A club spokesman said it appears Johnston, a 35-year-old veteran who has been dogged by injuries this season, will be sidelined for the rest of the season.

Johnston received a gash on the left side of his face after colliding with teammate Bobby Rousseau. Rousseau spun into the air and his skating landed on Johnston's cheek, opening a laceration which was sutured.

Johnston was taken to hospital for further examination, and doctors decided to operate immediately.

Johnston, in his 13th season in the National Hockey League, has missed four of the team's last six games with a groin injury. He has missed 15 of the club's 38 games to date, and earlier in the season was sidelined by a gash over the eye and a cracked wrist bone.

The club said a defenceman will probably be called up to take Johnston's place.

## Kensington Proud Of New Fire Hall And Equipment

KENSINGTON — The thriving Prince County town of Kensington has "some of the best fire fighting equipment for its size of town in the province," according to Mayor Everett Champion.

This winter marked completion of Kensington's new fire hall and sinking of another well with an accompanying pump. The new pump is a 150 gallon per minute turbine unit that is set into a 30,000 gallon underground reservoir tank. Two years ago the fire department added a second pump to the fleet.

The town can be justly proud of its equipment for it was the first in the province to establish the "rural" program of fire protection through the Kensington department. This method has been successfully operated over the past five years or so.

The enrollment figures are collected by members of the women's institutes in the various districts so it becomes a truly co-operational unit. Population of the program is indicated by the number of quizes the town receives. Mayor Champion said as a result of the Stanley and Matigone, generally speaking, in a 10-mile radius, the Fire Chief Bruce MacLeod had about 600 rural subscribers enrolled last year.

The old fire hall in Kensington was located in what is now called the old post office building. This was torn down and the new one constructed in its place. The new hall is about 54 by 22 feet and adjoins the "old post office building" which is currently undergoing renovations to make it into the town hall.

Chief MacLeod is justly proud of his department and crew of 14. The firemen are Lester MacLeod and Ron Kennedy, deputy chiefs; Charlie Beirnie, Gordon Kennedy, Elmer MacLeod, Andrew MacLeod, a son, Wayne Champion, Linwood Gird, Fred Folland, Ivan Giff, Elsworth Smith, Earl Dunning and John Struthers.

The men beam with pride when they show visitors the hall and equipment. When a stranger leaves the hall after a 20-minute visitation he probably has a better appreciation than he had before of the fire fighting problems that he has had previously.

The new truck purchased two years ago is a class "A" pump truck that delivers 150 gallons a minute and is always loaded with 500 gallons. The older engine is a class "B" pump truck that delivers 100 gallons a minute and also carries a complement of 500 gallons of water. This engine too is a class "A" pump truck.

In addition each truck has an auxiliary pump that delivers 100 gallons a minute portable pump that can be easily connected with a hose.
