Inspects R.C.A.F Recruiting Units In Province

Group Captain P. A. Gilchrist, D.F.C., C.D., of R.C.A.F. headquarters, Ottawa, arrived in Summerside on Tuesday evening for an inspection of the local R.C.A.F. recruiting unit. G.C. Gilchrist is director of personnel training at Air Force Headquarters, and in this position he is responsible for the policy concerning recruiting, as well as the supervision of the air force recruiting units across Canada.

Group Captain Gilchrist is visiting all the recruiting units for the first time since assuming his present position early in the year. He was formerly commanding officer of the Canadian Joint Service Air Training Centre, Toronto, Ontario, where paratroop and glider training is provided for all the Canadian services.

During the course of his visit, G.C. Gilchrist also inspected the mobile recruiting unit in Charlottetown. He was accompanied to Charlottetown by F/L J. A. Robertson, commanding officer of the Summerside recruiting unit.

The Group Captain stated that during the month of July a noticeable increase in recruiting for both aircrew and ground trades has been experienced, although recruiting in June was not as brisk as the average month. He expects that recruiting activity will produce the required number of recruits for the remainder of the year, and announced that already aircrew intakes were filled several weeks in advance.

This was Group Captain Gilchrist's first visit to Prince Edward Island, although he had seen it from the air on several occasions, while serving with the R. A. F. Ferry Command early in the Second World War. He stated that he found the Province very pleasant, particularly so for the refreshing breeze which is usually present, even on a warm day. Ottawa has had a very hot summer, and he expressed regret that he was unable to remain here a few days longer. He will visit recruiting units in Halifax and St. John's, Nfld., prior to returning to Ottawa.

Bedeque Man Appointed Acting Headmaster At Mount Allison Academy

SACKVILLE, N. B., July 23 - Dr. W. T. Ross Flemington, President of Mount Allison University, has announced the appointment of Alden Douglas Leard, of Bedeque, P. E. I., as acting Headmaster of Mount Allison Academy and Commercial College, succeeding Kenneth A. Parker who has accepted a position as Superintendent of Schools in Charlottetown.

Mr. Leard was appointed to the staff of Mount Allison Academy and Commercial College in 1939 when Dr. Flemington was Headmaster there. His first teaching was in the academic work but later he became the very successful Director of the Commercial College and lecturer in Commerce years at Mount Allison. Mr. Leard takes over this new position with a thorough knowledge of the school and its traditions. The Academy and Commercial College gives the work of the Junior Matriculation Year and Diploma Courses in Secretarial, Business Administration and Stenography.

After graduating from 4th year Prince of Wales, Mr. Leard completed the work for the Bachelor of Arts Degree at Mount Allison. He then took the Finance and Commerce Diploma Course at the University and additional work in the field at LaSalle and at the Shaw Business College in Toronto. During the war Mr. Leard spent each summer with the Y.M.C.A. war services in various parts of Canada.

First Airman At S'side Station Back For Visit

The first airman ever to be stationed at R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, is here today on temporary duty for a short visit. Flying Officer G.R. (Vic) Merlthew, St. Catharines, Ont., was posted to R.C.A.F. Station here in July, 1940, while the airport was under construction.

He was then a corporal charged with the organization of a complete security guard. During the next three months he was not only the first airman but the only airman on the station until 15 aircrew trainees arrived in September, 1940, to form a security guard.

Having been the first airman on Station, Summerside he duplicated this distinction during the next two months by being the first and only airman at R.C.A.F. airport then under construction at Charlottetown.

F.O. Merlthew recalls, with a chuckle, that in those days the only excitement at either airport consisted of watching Carl Burke come in twice a day in a Beechcraft carrying passengers between Charlottetown, Summerside, and Moncton.
