art, Cck, Prowse and other civic leaders. It must be tough when a man votes for a boost in his own taxes.

One hoary old Island myth which at one time was widely accepted has been pretty well laid by the heels in recent years. Folks in this part of Canada were accustomed to agree that the Island was a cheaper place to live than other parts of the Dominion. Of late years the story has changed, and most people know that the great majority of Islanders get along on less than some of their neighbors. Consumption goods in this Province are as high as any place in Canada. We may buy farm products at slightly lower costs, but canned goods, fresh fruit, coal, fuel oil, electric power and clothing are all in the top brackets compared to most Canadian cities and towns.

It would seem natural that such table necessities as potatoes and fish would be much lower here than in Toronto for instance. Actually it is said the variation is so little in our favor as to have little effect on the over-all cost of living. Furthermore we have no dirt cheap hydro power as in Ontario.

As was expected the "Islanders" Hockey Club is taking part as finalists in the windup to the Big Four Hockey League, and have won the opener to the play-downs. Many fans are wondering what is in store for the club next year and are more concerned about the club's future, than its immediate ice triumphs. No one can give a pat answer to the many questions being asked.

One interesting story developed after the visit here of Johnny Gagnon, National League Scout, and great Canadian linemate of Howie Morens for some years. It is understood that Johnny proposed that the "Islanders" train at Three Rivers next year with Montreal Canadiens, and the Providence Reds, thus assuring themselves of plenty of talent. Training expenses would be met by playing exhibition games.

Leo Lamoureux of course, has a stand-in with his old club, and it is not unlikely that the training scheme, if financial arrangements are favorable, will be adopted. This season of course, has been a costly one for the Islanders, and some reorganization will be a just essential to any 1951-52 plans.

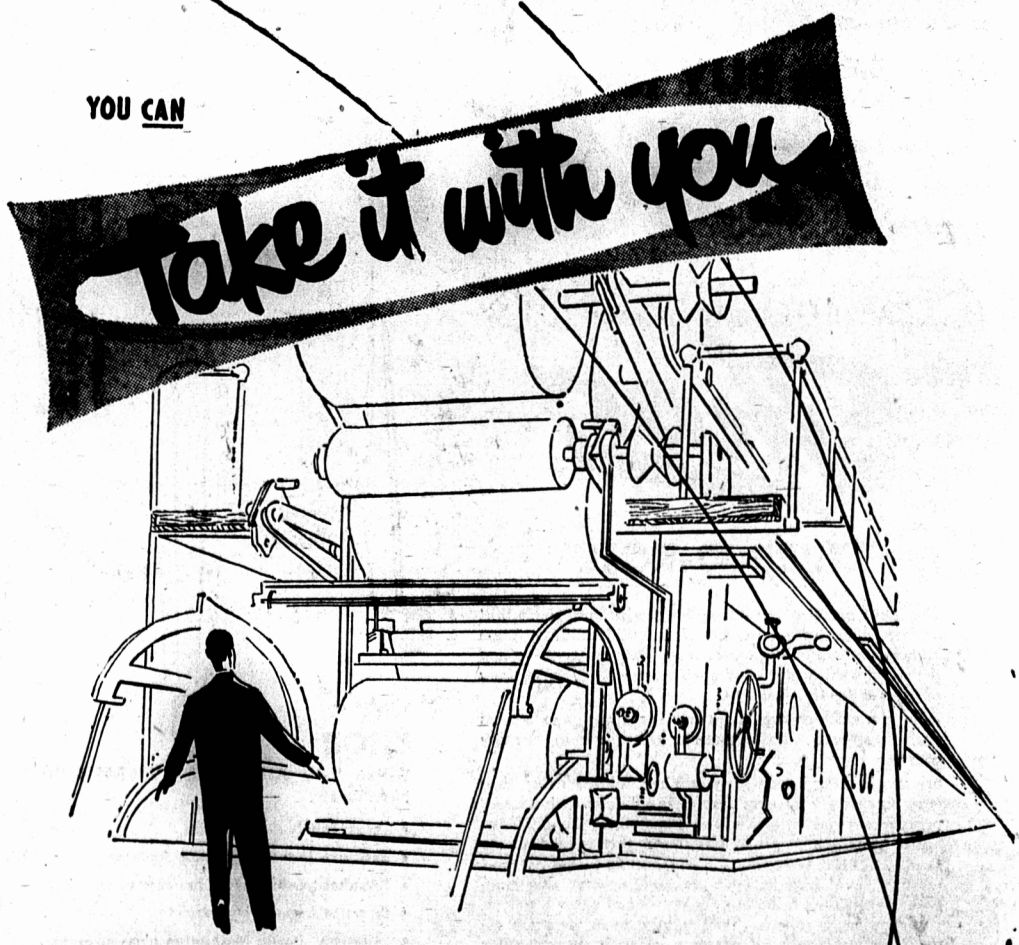
