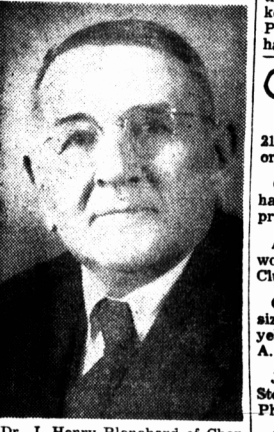

### Civic Presentation At Banquet

Our people will be paying twice. This does not seem fair. It does not seem reasonable and it does not seem equitable. Our party plans to stand on the present policy where everybody gets a fair deal. We do not expect to make favorites of those who now expect electricity. I don't think any fair minded person would expect more.

Have our Conservative friends seriously considered the many implications of the program which they now propose? Before we proceeded to implement our present rural electrification program we employed the best technical and economic advisors we could obtain. We carefully considered every possible method of bringing service lines to the greatest number at the least cost maintaining fairness to the tax payers of the Province.

With our present knowledge their proposal if carried into effect would be most unfair to present users of electric power who would be forced through taxes to pay all the costs for future rural extensions.

We the Liberal party are seriously considering the idea of making some rebate to those who have had to pay the costs of service lines extending beyond 500 feet. We are not making this suggestion because its implementation will depend upon the over-all cost to the tax payers. It is utterly fantastic as stated in the Conservative platform that power lines will be brought to your yards free of cost. Somebody must pay the bill. Who will it be? You or your neighbours?

I would like to point out that the present Fisheries Loan Board is a nonpolitical body and has been such for a number of years. In another paragraph they mention Old Age Pension increases. It is a vague offer and it is an additional election promise being made by the Liberal Government. It is present Liberal Government has been doing that very thing for a long time. We contribute as high as an additional \$25 for needy persons. It seems strange that our Conservative opponents, although they have had six members in each Legislature for the last eight years, did not know of this policy. There may not be more than a few hundred received additional grants but nevertheless the policy is carried out in operation and is carried out by the Liberal Government. They make reference to hospital benefits. I am sure that almost every political party in Canada is very conscious of the necessity for a hospital and sickness program. The cost of this is exceedingly high and the general opinion is at the present time that it would be extremely difficult and very impractical to put any such policy into operation.

What the future may have in store no one really knows, but if our Conservative opponents were at the present time it could lead to the early bankruptcy of the Province. Hospital and medical care for those presently receiving Mothers' Allowance has been under consideration by the Government for about a year. We have not made any promise on it because the final decision has not been worked out. It could be a costly undertaking and must be carefully considered before being finally inaugurated. The Prince Edward Island Medical Association has offered to provide its services in this field. I would like to remind the electors of the province that the present Mothers' Allowance Act was put into operation by me while I was Minister of Health and Welfare. The Legislation for it was drawn up by me. I feel sure that if there are any additional grants to needy mothers that policy will be implemented by a Liberal administration.

### Makes Forced Landing In Charlottetown Harbour

Yesterday afternoon about 12:45 an Albatross plane of the United States Air Force was obliged to make a forced landing on Charlottetown harbor following engine trouble which developed in the amphibious craft about 50 miles northeast of here.

The plane which is attached to the Air Rescue Service was on a routine flight from Greenwood, Massachusetts having made a stop at Newfoundland en route. The commander of the plane, Capt. Peter Weber, Jr., of California, had the plane brought down in the harbor without damage to the craft or injury to the crew, all of whom are staying at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Other members of the crew include the pilot, Capt. A. A. Warzynek, Pittsburgh, Pa.; co-pilot, Lt. Robert L. Dyer, White Plains, N.Y.; navigator, C. T. Strong, Texas, flight engineer, S/Sgt. Edward H. Cheney, California, radio operator, Robert L. Campbell, Oregon; passengers, Lt. R. N. MacPherson, Rochester, N.Y., and Airman 1st Class W. H. Clements, Evansville, Indiana.

City Police, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, members of the City Works Department and Harbor Master Wallace Macdonald and son all co-operated to tow the large craft to Paoli's wharf where it was made secure for the night. It is not known when repairs will be effected.

Weber was very thankful that he and his crew were able to make the landing without mishap but expressed profound appreciation for the co-operation received from both the police and civilian workers. "The United States Government is very happy to have such people for allies, he said. The plane commander respectfully asked the co-operation of citizens in keeping away from the ship until repairs are completed.

### Inspiring Message Given In Baccalaureate Sermon

"Being a Christian means belonging to the future", Rev. William Enright, C.Ss.R., told the Graduate Class '55 of St. Dunstan's University in his Baccalaureate sermon preached in the College Chapel on Sunday evening. Rev. Father Enright continued, in part:

"The true Christian is one who never loses sight of that sublime destiny, who, in order to attain it, finds nothing too difficult; neither the obscurities of faith, nor the struggles against evil, nor even death itself. However heavy the burden, he is always willing to bear it, comparing it, like St. Paul, to the weight of glory God reserves for him in the hereafter. That is how Christianity makes of us citizens of a better humanity. Outside of Christianity, humanity has ever been and will always be ignorant of the meaning of life, Father Enright, continued.

"Note the diversity, the contradictions, the uncertainty, the absurd theories, the vague systems among those who would fain explain life apart from God."

**DUAL CITIZENSHIP**  
"The training you have received here has oriented you to the whole of life. It kept before your vision the paramount fact that you are Christians, and that as Christians you have a dual citizenship; one in the life which is to come as well as one in the present life.
