AT THE marine examination in St. John on Thursday last, Mr. B. McIsaac, of this Island, was granted a master's certificate.

BURGLARIES.—Last night the store of Mr. P. Munroe, on the corner of Fitzroy and Great George Streets, was entered by burglars and two dollars in cash and a small chest of tea stolen therefrom. The burglars entered from the front street. No clue to the burglars. The window of Miss Bannoun's shop on Sydney Street was forced open by some unknown persons and all the saleables in it extracted.

FORGERY.—William Boultonhouse, of Moncton, has been examined on a charge of forgery and committed for trial. The Moncton Times states that the prisoner "is of a respectable family, and formerly lived in Sackville. Latterly, however, he has been employed as fireman in the shifting engine in the Moncton station yard, from which position he was discharged some months ago for sufficient reasons."

AT the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, Charles Burke appeared for being drunk and incapable. He was fined \$1 or four days. L. Whelan, for a like offence, was fined the same. Michael Began and Pete McGuigan appeared on remand, charged with stealing a coat from Capt. W. H. Barnard. JOHN DUNN has written a letter to the effect that he does not intend to permanently exclude the missionaries from his territory, but wishes to have more control over their actions. This letter has not allayed the very strong feeling existing against the exclusion of Europeans from Zululand, and it is stated that some of the missionaries intend to attempt to regain possession of their stations on the ground that their sites were given to them by Panda and Cetwayo.
