Six Witnesses Heard In Lee Case Yesterday

Six witnesses were heard yesterday at the trial of Harold Clement Lee, charged with the theft of money from Anglin-Norcross (Maritimes Limited), at the June session of the Supreme Court. Mr. Justice G. J. Twedy is presiding.

The case arose on an alleged holdup, in which the accused claimed to have been struck on the head by an assailant whom he said was hiding in the back seat of his (Lee's) car. After leaving the bank where the accused had cashed cheques covering the company payroll and petty cash account on Friday, April 20, his assailant is reportedly revealed his presence soon after the car was put in motion. Lee claims that he

voice from the rear of the car ordering him to keep going and directing him out of the City into the Trans Canada Highway between Charlottetown and Borden.

The greater part of yesterday's "taken up with the cross-examination of August 10, 1955, Superintendent for Anglin-Norcross by J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C., defence counsel.

At one point in his examination Mr. Campbell produced a blank cheque bearing the Anglin-Norcross stamp and the signature of the witness, who when questioned said that he had signed blank cheques on a number of occasions. The one in question probably had been signed and given to Lee prior to his (Savoys) proceeding on holiday. Considerable questioning also centered around some receipts for the amount of \$27 which were received by Dominic Doyle, dated October 15, 1955, which almost coincided with the date of a shortage of \$250 in the petty cash. Mr. Campbell also questioned the witness regarding the reported quantities of cement and plywood that were being delivered around town.

Referring to the shortage in petty cash, witness said that Lee had reported it in October. Defence the suggested that witness had been sending false reports to Montreal from that time until April 20, and witness said "that's right". "I suggest that, until you found a fall guy for your operations you did not feel safe in reporting," said Mr. Campbell which the witness denied. Witness said that his trust in Lee was changed when he was told by Mr. Uerwood from head office that there were discrepancies in his (Lee's) work.

Mrs. Mary Prunty, teller, Canadian Bank of Commerce, said the accused had been in the bank between 10:30 and 11:00 a.m., April 20 and described the procedure followed by Lee when cashing company cheques. She also gave an explanation of the pencilled figures on the reverse side of the cheques. She said that the bills for the payroll were secured with an elastic band and those for the petty cash were loose.

OTHER EVIDENCE

Reginald Denny, Charlottetown, told of first seeing Lee standing beside his (Lee's) car four or five miles this side of Hampton on April 20 and of being hailed by the accused, who staggered over

to the car and climbed in asking to be taken to a phone. He took Lee to the Cameron home where he left the accused lying on the couch while he went to Hampton with Cameron for the purpose of phoning Charlottetown. Returning they picked up Lee and drove to where the Lee car was; Cameron then drove the car if the accused to Hampton.

Dr. Peter MacDonald said that he saw and treated the accused in a car outside Dunsford's Store at Hampton and that the accused appeared to be emotion: upset and in pain. He found no marks, bruises or swelling and was only able to locate the area by finger pressure and the response of the accused. He administered a mild sedative and called for the ambulance.

Ex-Cst. Peter Hill, R.C.M.P., said that he along with Csts. Tedford, Bungay and Tibbo were the first police to arrive at Hampton and that he had received the keys of Lee's car from Cst. Tedford. Looking in the car he unlocked it and turned the key over to Chief MacArthur. He then took the accused into the police car while he

The final witness Ralph Cameron, confirmed the evidence of Denny, after their arrival at his home. He told of finding a light brown wallet on the floor of the back seat of Lee's car and that when he handed it to Lee, the accused said, "There is no use looking in it, there is nothing there".

This witness was questioned at some length by Mr. Campbell on the exact location where they first saw Lee's car. The answers failed to satisfy the defence and permission was requested for Messrs. Campbell, Nicholson, Denny and Cameron to visit the area early last evening to establish the place, definitely. The hearing was then adjourned until 10:30 this morning.

The members of the Petit Jury are: Edward Downe (foreman), James Lafferty, Louis Sherren, Benjamin Livingstone, Jr., Warren MacDonald, Chester Walsh, Wendell Mullins, Frank Gills, Wilfred Stretch, Joseph Driscoll, Heber McAusland and Allison MacRae. Eleven jurymen were challenged by the defence and the Crown asked that five be "good aside."
