FARM WORK IN SUMMER.
Silage and Green Crops—Garden Hints—
Timely Notes.
A lawn mower that will cut high
grass will become a favorite, but it may
lead to negligence of the lawn on the
part of some.
Turkeys hatched as late as July 1
which were profitable birds, though for
heavy weights the earlier they are
hatched the better.
Cultivate often. It warms the soil
in early spring. It allows even light
rains to permeate the soil and retains
the moisture for use in summer.
The moisture of a nation's prosperity is
the broad shoulders of its farmers.
Place burdens on these shoulders and
all others will be weighed down and
times will be hard.
Milk and eggs are two articles that
the farmer sold for cash and they enable
the farmer to receive daily re-
turns. He does not have to wait for
harvest time with such products.
It is usually a foolish waste of money
to feed a dry cow through a long win-
ter; more is to be made by selling both
cows and feed. Few cows are good
enough to keep unless they are giving
milk liberally.
Improved breeds of cattle are regard-
ed with favor because they have large
feeding capacity. The "breed and the
tough" can only be combined by se-
lecting stock that makes the most gain
from the food.
The man who knows and appreciates
just when to use the roller and the har-
row upon the ground for his best good
and the good of his crop, is well ahead
of the best thought of the age in mat-
ters of soil tillage.
Potato beetles will leave potatoes to
attack the plants. They seem to have
greater partiality for eggs planted to
for anything else, though they will also
feast on potato plants if potatoes are
not up and growing.
Sow the cabbage seed for your lat-
est plants. Make a bed on the open ground,
use fine, well-rotted manure, and sow
the seed in rows, so as to permit of
keeping the grass and weeds out of the
way of the young plants.
The pig farrowed in April should
reach 200 pounds before Christmas, and
the clover field is the best place for
it. Give growing pigs a mess of bran
and skim milk at night, and they will
need but little other food if they have
the run of a clover field.
The best varieties of plums are very
profitable, and fruit growers are of the
unanimous opinion that the curculio is
a thing not much to be dreaded;
where plums are planted in large quan-
tities its ravages are hardly felt. It is
the isolated tree which suffers.
At the agricultural experiment sta-
tion at Champaign, Ill., they have tested
the methods of corn culture for five
successive years. Faithful trials with
surface culture and deep culture of this
plant have resulted quite favorably to
the method of shallow cultivation.
Winter wheat is one of the hardest of
crops, and unless attacked by insects
 seldom fails to produce fairly well in
yield. For that reason wheat will re-
ceive attention on many farms and can
stand upon as being sure to return
something in the shape of straw and
grain.
Use a crowbar in setting up the Lima
bean poles, and stick them down deep
enough to protect them against the
winds. Much carelessness is sometimes
shown in the placing of the poles, and
when a few of them fall down they
cause the entire garden to appear un-
sightly.
Survival of the fittest is the law of
business and trade. It is Nature's
law. Poor farmers will be squeezed to
death. There is no way to prevent it.
The poor merchant goes down, and the
skillful mechanic never gets ahead;
the same rule must work with the tiller
of the soil.
Clover, by increasing the fertility of
the soil, enables the farmer to keep
more stock, which also adds to the bulk
of the manure heap. It is in the
manure that the wealth of the farm is
stored, for a time arrives when it is
converted into products which bring in
cash returns.
If you want early strawberries next
spring, and can spare the space, let the
bed remain over until the following
year. It is the old, abandoned bed that
gives the earliest berries, though they
may not be equal in size and quality to
the berries grown on a new plot and well
cultivated.
Geese are seldom troubled with the
diseases so common to other fowls.
Those are most thrifty which are hatched
early and they grow larger. They do
not mature until about the third year,
and the eggs are not trustworthy
for hatching until the hen is about
15 months old.
When a man is buying an animal
of good blood he is buying one of good
traits and good habits, capable of trans-
mitting the same to other genera-
tions, but let it drop from these habits, de-
terioration at once sets in, and it is
only a matter of time until it has re-
ached a common level with the ver-
tebrate stock.
Milk as food for pigs has a feed-
ing value far beyond its actual food
elements if given in the proper propor-
tion with earthen water, but it is a
great waste to rear pigs exclusively upon
it, no matter how plentiful it may
be. Middlings and grass should be fed
with it, and so double the amount of
pigs kept with the same milk.
Scarlet fever failed on many fields
of the farmers are encouraging the
idea. It is perhaps due to the late
sowing last fall. It is claimed for the
new clover that it may be sowed in
August or September, but experience
has taught many of the farmers who
used the seed that September is too
late, as the plants should have more
time to grow before cold weather sets
in. The safer method is to sow the
clover in August, as soon as the
rains begin after the warm days of
summer.
