OUR STOCK PROSPECTS.

The season just now drawing to a close has been an encouraging one for our stock raisers. There was good pasture and an abundant hay crop, while the root crops (except that of potatoes) are well up to the average. The results of the past summer have been more milk than ever before, and larger products of cheese and butter; and the prospects for the coming winter are abundance of excellent fodder for milch cows and young and fattening cattle, besides sheep and other animals. In view of the comparative failure of the grain crops of this Province in the current year, it has been truly said that our cattle and the butter and cheese factories which they are the means of supplying with milk, have been the salvation and mainstay of the country. The increasing demand for lambs and sheep as well as cattle, created by the new outlet found in the Lake Winnipeg sailing direct to Great Britain, is an additional encouragement to our farmers to go on enlarging and improving their herds and flocks. For this purpose it is important that our farmers should hold on to their best females, and secure the services of good pure-bred males. It is folly to sell the fine heifer or the excellent cow, or the large and well bred ewe lamb or ewe, and keep the poor ones, even though the prices are higher and money is needed. Far better sell the poor ones at low prices than the good ones at high prices! Our farmers ought to strive earnestly towards an improvement in respect to quality and size as well as an enlargement of the number of their cattle and sheep. An inducement to this end has lately been given by buyers of stock. These gentlemen now buy lambs and sheep, as well as cattle, by weight. The consequence is that the farmer who has large lambs etc., for sale obtains considerably more money for them than the farmer who has only small ones. The latter can not justly complain, for everyone will admit that purchase by weight is fair; and he must needs set to work to enlarge and improve his animals. Upon a like principle, the practice of testing milk at the factories operates towards an improvement of the quality of our milch cows. In any case, our farmers will do well if they get the best, whether in dairy cattle, or beef cattle or pigs—and keep only the best. This is the more important, if we would be successful in the British markets.

Ours is a wonderfully productive little country. Our meadows and pastures are admirably excellent. We occupy an advantageous position in respect to the markets of the neighboring Provinces and of the Old World. Let us take occasion by the hand, and from the present exceptionally favorable year go on towards a large and profitable development of our herds and flocks.

THE BRITISH CONSUMER.

Mild Flavours in Butter Wanted.

During the winter and summer, says Prof. Robertson, British consumers want fresh flavoured, fresh made butter without any evidence of staleness. They want also in most markets a butter of mild flavour and not heavily salted. They also want it pale in colour, lighter than ordinary straw colour, at most seasons of the year. In passing I may mention that they are great sticklers for neat, nice-looking clean, undamaged packages. The demand from all markets to-day, is for a finer, a daintier class of food. People who work in all kinds of factories will not take strong tasting foods; they will not buy strong-flavoured bacon, and they cannot be tempted, except by a very low price, into buying strong-flavoured butter or strong-flavoured cheese.

The increase in the consumption of fine butter in Great Britain is enormous, and so long as the quality is kept fine fresh-flavoured and mild, it is likely that there will be a demand equal to all of the increased production.
