A WAR MEDAL.—Mr. L. W. Cook has shown us a fine medal, commemorative of the South African war and of Canadian participation in it. The obverse bears the raised figure of a soldier in fighting trim, holding aloft a bunch of maple leaves. This side also has the words "Canada Shares in the Glory" and "South Africa 1900," the latter being enclosed by a laurel wreath. The reverse bears the arms of the seven Canadian Provinces and the Royal Standard surmounted by the Crown. In the centre is "Canada congratulates her Queen." The medal is one of the best we have seen, and is a durable and tasteful reminder of the war.
