MONDAY

A truck owned by Lee Taylor of Nine Mile Creek was lost off the Rocky Point Ferry on Saturday afternoon about 3:30 as the ferry was crossing from Charlottetown to Rocky Point.

In the second railroad crossing accident in Alberton in less than three weeks, Mr. Robert Campbell of Elmsdale was rushed to the Western Hospital with chest and head injuries after crashing into the engine of a special freight train about 6:30 last evening.

Twenty-three-month-old Brian, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Chappell, 336 Central St., in Summerside, suffered a painful and unfortunate accident at his home Sunday morning about 11 a.m.

A 1935 Ford car, reported to have been driven by boy from Wellington, struck a group of young people in front of the Co-Op Store in Wellington on Sunday evening, sending two of them, a boy and a girl, to the Prince County Hospital in Summerside.

The two, both visitors to Wellington, were Victoria Farrah, 13, from the Magdalen Islands; and George Gaudet, 14, of St. Nicholas, whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Gaudet, of St. Nicholas, now living in Summerside.

TUESDAY

The 29th annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation will open at Prince of Wales College this morning with the report of the president, Miss Mabel O'Brien, at 10:30, to be followed by addresses by His Worship Mayor J. D. Stewart and Hon. Premier J. Walter Jones, Minister of Education.

The guest speaker at the convention will be Dr. C. E. Phillips, B.A., D. Paed., Professor of Education and Supervisor of Graduate Students, Ontario College of Education, University of Toronto.

who will speak on two topics of vital importance to education, "High Schools for All," and "Education for the Teaching Profession."

A short meeting of the executive of the P.E.I.T.F. was held yesterday afternoon at P. W. C. when Miss Helen Yeo gave her report as a delegate to the meeting of the Advisory Research Committee of the Canadian Teachers' Federation which was held in Ottawa in November, to discuss the inauguration of an independent research bureau for Canada.

Thirty-two members and local presidents who had been invited to attend were present at the meeting of the Board of Governors which followed.

OTTAWA, April 14 (Special)—Tenders are solicited today by the Department of Public Works for construction work in connection with improvements to Savage Harbor on the north shore of Prince Edward Island in Kings County at the border of Queens.

Plans and specifications for the project are available either at Ottawa headquarters, the district engineer at Charlottetown or the post office at Mount Stewart, P. E. I. A deposit of \$25 is required for blueprints and specifications for the work.

In this year's main parliamentary estimates, cost of the Savage Harbor repairs is placed at \$156,000. Of this total, \$129,000 is a carry-over from 1951, when \$130,000 was earmarked for the project and only \$1,000 spent.

Contracts for two projects in Summerside and at the Summerside air station, costing approximately \$1,550,000, have been let, it was announced yesterday by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to the Federal Minister of Finance.

An official announcement is expected within a few days that a contract has been let for the complete reconstruction of the Marine Wharf at Summerside, the building of a new roof proof warehouse and extensive dredging. Amount of the contract, let to J. P. Porter and Son, Ltd., Montreal, is approximately \$1,250,000. Tenders were called in October.

Mr. MacNaught said the steel had been allocated some time ago for the wharf.

The other large contract is for the construction of a permanent type building for the Mechanical Engineering Section of the R.C.A.F. at the Summerside air station. It will cost approximately \$300,000.

WEDNESDAY

Teachers from all parts of the Island arrived in the city on Monday and Tuesday to attend the 29th annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation, which opened at Prince of Wales College yesterday morning with an excellent attendance.

The mornings' program was highlighted by an address by Hon. Premier J. Walter Jones, who discussed many of the difficulties being encountered in the educational field in this Province, and discussed his views upon these problems and upon the subject in general.

Miss Mabel O'Brien, president of the Federation, opened the session with her report on the year's activities. After introducing members of the executive who were present on the platform to the audience and welcoming the delegates briefly, she mentioned the sorrow caused by the death of his late Majesty King George VI and the accession of the new Queen.

One of the two bridged sections of the roadway at Fullerton's Marsh caved in at noon yesterday isolating that section of the country from a direct approach to the city. It is expected that temporary repairs will be effected today by

the Department of Public Works. Districts temporarily cut off include Mt. Herbert, Mount Ryan, Mermald, Johnston's River and Fort Augustus.

The steel and cement surfacing of the bridge collapsed when the concrete pilings broke loose from their moorings when pushed by the tide.

"High Schools for All"—not only the extreme need for them but the type they should be—the topic of a most interesting address given by Dr. C. E. Phillips, B.A., D. Paed., at Prince of Wales College last evening, speaking to delegates to the P. E. I. T. F. convention and interested members of the general public who were in attendance.

He stated the need for high schools in general for the whole country, for the following reasons; that except in time of war, or preparation for war, in an age of higher production and greater leisure than ever before, the economy of the country cannot absorb its youth as early an age as was possible in times gone by.

Extension of the Charlottetown Airport runway to at least double its present length would willingly be undertaken if the Federal Government if the citizens of Charlottetown were to purchase the necessary land for this enlargement. Mayor J. D. Stewart reported last night to the City Council, following his recent visit to Ottawa with Premier J. Walter Jones.

At Mayor Stewart's suggestion, the Council moved to have a survey made to ascertain what amount of land would be involved in this transaction, and at the same time, obtain from the Department of Transport a decision on exactly how far they would participate in the development.

The Mayor reported that he and Premier Jones had had "a very satisfactory interview" with the chairman of the Air Transport Board of the Department of Transport on the airport subject.

He was completely aware of the necessity of a runway being extended to at least double its present length, and suggested that if the owners of the airport, the citizens of Charlottetown, were to purchase the necessary land for this enlargement, the Department would take care of the necessary construction work," Mayor Stewart said.

The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last evening in the Town Hall with Mayor Henry Wedge in the chair and all Councillors present.

Two letters of acknowledgment were read by the Town Clerk, one from the Royal Family in connection with a message of sympathy at the death of the King; the other an acknowledgment of Summerside's membership in the Federation of Mayors and Municipalities.

Considerable discussion took place regarding retirement pensions for town employees and a notice of motion was made that a by-law will be brought in at the next meeting regarding a pension plan for permanent town employees.

Councillor Morrison, chairman of the finance committee, in his report, showed an increase under street of \$6,730.00 over the same three months in 1951. This was accounted for through increased cost of snow removal.

THURSDAY

Prince Edward Island, its industries and recreational opportunities, will be shown to prospective immigrants in Europe who are planning to come to Canada to settle.

Arrangements have just been completed between the P. E. I. Tourist and Information Bureau and the Federal Department of Citizenship and Immigration to circulate a new Prince Edward Island color-sound film in the Netherlands, the United Kingdom, Denmark and possibly Germany.

The first film has already been forwarded by Miss A. E. Home, Information Officer with the Department of Citizenship and Immigration to The Netherlands.

Prince of Wales College is a combination of teacher training institution, high school and junior college, and at no time has the idea ever been contemplated of turning it into a University, stated Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of the College, during the course of a panel discussion in the Vocational School last evening.

The discussion took place before a large audience in the agricultural room of the school. Held under the auspices of West Kent Home and School Association, it was attended also by Queen Square and

Prince Street Association members, as well as by teachers and the general public. Mr. F. A. Large, Q. C., presided as chairman of the programme committee.

Speakers on the panel, of which Mr. Frank W. Curtis was chairman, comprised Dr. C. E. Phillips, Ontario College of Education, Dr. Lloyd Shaw, Deputy Minister, Mr. Clarence Mercer, supervisor of the Summerside High School, and Mrs. W. E. Scantlebury, parent and former teacher. In addition, Hon. W. E. Darby, Attorney General and Provincial Treasurer, attended and accepted a cordial invitation to address the meeting.

A feast of Guiding was served at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday when the Provincial Commissioner, Mrs. Gordon Monaghan, presided at the well attended and enthusiastic annual meeting of the Provincial Girl Guide Association.

The reports were most encouraging and proof that many hours of thought and work had been contributed by public spirited citizens in the interest of the youth of our province.

Mrs. D. M. MacGuire read the minutes of the previous meeting, and also gave a financial statement showing receipts for \$1,880.22, and the balance on hand \$1,379.51.

Dr. C. E. Phillips, in a forthright address on "Education for the Teaching Profession" at Prince of Wales College yesterday afternoon told his listeners, the members of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation who are attending a three day convention here, "I urge you to hold the standards you've obtained now and seek to advance them." He was speaking in reference to a suggestion that teacher standards in P. E. I. might be lowered still further.

Dr. Phillips pointed out that Canada, whose average standard for teacher training is high school graduation and one year of professional training, is the only country in the civilized world which attempts to train teachers in one year. In England the minimum amount of profession training required is two years, in Scotland it is three years and may be raised to four, and in the United States in 21 States a university degree is required.

Joseph Arsenault, Jr., 14, was drowned yesterday morning at 10:30 at Harper's Station pond near Tignish when he fell from a small raft while trout fishing.

Although accompanied by six other boys, all younger than himself, the Arsenault boy was alone on the raft, endeavouring to recover his fishing rod which had fallen into the water. It was reported the raft broke in two. He sank immediately. His companions summoned help but it was noon before the body was recovered.

The accident was investigated by the Alberton detachment of the R.C.M.P. Coroner Dr. W. A. Shea of Alberton decided no inquest would be held.

The pond is about a mile from the boy's home.

Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Arsenault of Tignish, three sisters also survive. They are Mrs. N. MacDonald, Winnipeg; Rita Arsenault in the United States and Jeanette Arsenault at home.

FRIDAY

Two arrests were made by City Police at noon yesterday following the report of a break and theft of goods from the department store of Prowse Bros. Ltd. The pair, one from here and the other from Saint John will be arraigned before the Police Court Magistrate this morning.

The arrests at noon were made by Sergeant Sterns Webster and Detective Sergeant A. J. Lund. Chief of Police MacArthur advised last night that police had recovered considerable goods identified by list as loot from Prowse Brothers store. The items were located at the east end of the city and were in good condition.

The break was discovered about 7:30 yesterday morning and a quick check was made by H. H. Jewell, store manager, who estimated the upwards of \$1,000 worth of merchandise was taken.

STEAMER ARRIVES — The first steamer to arrive in Charlottetown this season was the "Magdalen", from the Magdalen Islands, which arrived last evening. After loading, the steamer will proceed to Picton, completing a three way run which began from Picton several days ago. The Magdalen will continue on this run during the summer months. Captain Julien Menard is in command.

The regular train which leaves Summerside at seven o'clock in the morning for Emerald was delayed yesterday morning at Free-town. Three cars, one a box baggage car and two regular box cars left the tracks. An auxiliary train from Charlottetown was sent out to clear the track and a special train was dispatched from Summerside to take care of the passengers and mail. No one was injured.

A highly successful convention of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation ended yesterday noon, as the delegates met for an open forum meeting to conclude two and one half days of discussions, study groups, and addresses. During the sessions upwards of 550 members were in attendance.

Along with the general study groups at the convention there were a number of optional study groups, so arranged that the teachers might choose between groups capturing primary, intermediate or senior material, which proved to be a very popular innovation.

Something new was introduced by way of entertainment at the convention, which was also very much appreciated by the delegates. Instead of the banquet which has been held in other years, an evening of entertainment at P. W. C. was arranged for Wednesday night.
