TYPEWRITER PIONEER FETED AT 40th ANNIVERSARY DINNER

400 EMPLOYEES AND LEADING BUSINESS CELEBRITIES PAY TRIBUTE TO MR. J. J. SEITZ

Gold Plated Typewriter Presented To City to Commemorate Event

Gathered last evening in the Crystal Ballroom of the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, on the eve of the fortieth anniversary of the founding of their company, the Ontario Typewriter Co., Ltd., the 400 employees of the Underwood Elliott Fisher Limited paid tribute to their president, Mr. J. J. Seitz, father of the Underwood Typewriter in Canada.

Heading the parade of civic and industrial leaders who honored Mr. Seitz, His Worship Mayor McBride of Toronto commented on the notable contribution made by Mr. Seitz to the life of the city and the Dominion. Similar tributes were paid by Senator O'Connor, T. A. Russell, President of Canada Cycle and Motor Co. Ltd., Frank Matthews, President, Toronto Board of Trade, George Wilson, Toronto Finance Commissioner, N. S. Logan, General Manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, R. S. McLaughlin, President of general Motors of Canada.

Mr. Seitz in his reply to the many tributes, pointed out that this was the fortieth anniversary of the Underwood itself in Canada, and asked Mayor McBride to accept a specially designed typewriter for his own use as well as for that of future mayors. Glistering in gold plate, with the city's coat of arms and of the Empire flag engraved on it, the machine was presented to His Worship by Miss Irma Wright, Canada's own World's Speed Champion, on behalf of the employees, and executive of Underwood Elliott Fisher Limited.

Heading a program of unusual entertainment features that followed, Ernest Seitz, son of Mr. J. J. Seitz and well known composer, concert and radio pianist, played his own composition, "The World is Waiting for the Sunrise."

The many warm tributes revealed a remarkable business romance. Starting life as a telegrapher in the Hamilton office of the Northwestern Telegraph Company, J. J. Seitz, a native of Toronto, Ontario, received a raise of \$2.50 a month for his enterprise in making use of a typewriter in his work, the device being then a novelty. Foreseeing the future of the writing machine, Mr. Seitz resigned and journeyed to New York where he acquired the Canadian selling rights for the new machine invented. He opened a small office in Toronto, 1896, and sold, shipped and serviced typewriters himself. Three years later he established branches in Montreal, Hamilton and London, and moved to larger Toronto headquarters to take care of the increasing business.

Speed Typing Champion Irma Wright, who has won international fame, was the featured attraction of the evening. Her performance was a masterpiece of speed and accuracy. She was followed by other talented typewriters who demonstrated their skills in various typing exercises.
