EXHIBITION DEFICIT.—The Nova Scotia exhibition deficit amounts to \$861.81.

TELEPHONIC.—We learn that telephonic communication with the store of Albert Simpson, Esq., French River, has been established.

FALL BERRIES.—A branch of a raspberry bush bearing fruit was plucked in the garden of Government House yesterday. It was kindly and thoughtfully forwarded to THE EXAMINER office.

HOW MOODY DOES IT.—As is well known Evangelist Moody has a wonderful faculty for getting money, whether it be a simple collection to meet some current expenses or some large subscriptions with which to erect a new school building. Asked once as to the secret of his success in this particular line, the great preacher replied: "I urge people to give until they feel it, and then to keep on giving until they don't feel it.—November Ladies' Home Journal.

A SURE PENSION.—A bill has become law in New Zealand providing that every person of the age of 65 and upwards, of good moral character, whose yearly income does not exceed £34 (\$170), and who has resided for 25 years in the colony, will be entitled to a pension of £18 per annum from the government. Similar bills were introduced in 1896 and in 1897, but were defeated by narrow majorities. It is expected that 6,500 people will draw the £18 during the first year.

GOING TO WINNIPEG.—The opening of a new agency in Winnipeg by the Bank of Nova Scotia will rob Yarmouth of one of its most esteemed residents in the person of C. A. Kennedy, the agent there of the bank. Mr. Kennedy has been in Yarmouth for only one year but during that short period he and his estimable wife have made a host of friends, who, while deeply regretting their removal, will wish them happiness and prosperity in their western home. Mr. Kennedy was formerly in charge of the agency at Newcastle, removing from there to Yarmouth. He belongs to Charlottetown.—Halifax Chronicle.

APPLE CROP A FAILURE.—The apple crop of the United States is smaller than it has been since reliable statistics have been collected. The total supply from the 1898 crop of the United States is 27,700,000 barrels, compared with something over 40,000,000 last year, and 70,000,000 in the record breaking crop of 1896. The failure is widespread, reaching from the Pacific coast to Maine and in none of the states does the output of fruit approach an average. In the great apple states of the west the crop is almost an absolute failure, although the situation in Michigan is better than elsewhere. New York has only one-fifth of a full crop. The failure is attributed to the fact that during the blooming season there was excessive rainfall which washed the pollen and prevented proper fertilization by insects, while a cold wave added to the injury.

THE KING SLEPT

And His Navy had to Await Orders Until he Awoke.

The Montreal Witness publishes the following humorous extract from a letter from James A D McBan, a Montrealer in the service of the Sun Life Assurance Company, dated at Bangkok, in Siam, Aug 22nd, 1898:—

"On Friday the King determined to send a man-of-war to Java to congratulate Holland on the Queen's accession. really to show off a Siamese man-of-war officered by Europeans (our examiner, Surgeon Major Hays, among the number.) They had steam up at 2 p m, on Saturday, as ordered, but hours passed and the King's despatches hadn't arrived. At 7 p m, a message arrived that the King had gone to sleep without signing the despatches, and to draw fire. So the officers went to a concert in the club, but were called away from there at 11 p m. The King was awake! They sailed on Sunday at 5 a m. "This is a fair sample of the way things are done here by those in high places."

Naval Honors.

LOUISBURG, Oct. 29.—The sailor drowned from the tender of H M S Cordelia, was Timothy McCarthy, a native of Killarney, Ireland, aged 22 years. He was buried yesterday in the Roman Catholic cemetery with naval honors. The coffin was placed on a gun carriage, hauled by the blue jackets, and headed by the marines. The bagpipes played one of the "Gordon Clans."

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Montreal Star: The most remarkable feature of the international squabble has been the manner in which English statesmen of both parties forced the fighting. We may take it for granted that it was not through mere impulse, or mere coincidence that so many prominent British statesmen adopted such an unusually bellicose attitude. The most probable explanation is that they regarded war with France inevitable within a few years if the African question were permitted to remain in issue, and they saw no reason to wait for France and Russia to prepare for the struggle. Nobody suspects any of these statesmen of desiring war with France for the sake of war, of glory, or of conquest; but a purely defensive policy is not inconsistent with a due recognition of the importance of choosing the time as well as the place for a fight.
