SENTENCED.—William Hennessey, who murdered his wife in Boston some months ago, has been sentenced to ten years in the States' prison. Hennessey and his wife formerly lived in Charlottetown.

Wet and cold as the countryman was, he proceeded on his way home, declining the offer of his rescuers to convey him to a house where he could dry his clothing and put his horse up for the night.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.

Mr. Jones, of Halifax, asked in view of the fact that another fishery season was about to commence the Government could give any information regarding the modus vivendi.

Sir John Macdonald said the whole question considered to be open between the United States and Canada are now the subject of complication between Her Majesty's Minister and Mr. Blaine, United States Secretary of State. The subject more particularly engaging their attention just now is the Behring Sea dispute, but all will be dealt with in due time.

Mr. Mitchell said he had been informed that this matter now being dealt with at the Court of St. James, was now practically settled against Canada's contention.

Sir John said this statement was wholly inaccurate. The matter had been referred to Washington, and was being dealt with there.

Hon. Mr. Chapleau resumed the debate on the dual language question.

Closing Leather Factories.

WOBURN, Mass, Feb. 18.

The members of the Manufacturers Association at a meeting last night voted to close every leather factory represented in the Association to-morrow night, and keep them closed until the men return to work at the factory of Beggs & Cobb. This means the enforced idleness of 1,500 men as a result of the recently adopted price list. Most of the men in many of the shops went to work under protest, while in some factories the men decided not to do as much work for the pay provided for by the list as they were formerly required to do, claiming that that was the only resort left them. This was particularly the case in the shop of Beggs & Cobb, where the men still remain out, and not only will not return to work but the firm declares that they will not let the other men do the work ready and waiting to be done.

O'Shea's Divorce Case.

LONDON, Feb. 18.

In the probate, divorce and admiralty division of the high court of justice to-day, Justice Butt refused to grant the application made in behalf of Capt. O'Shea for writs of attachment against the managers of the Star and London edition of the New York Herald for publishing certain comments relative to the action for divorce brought by O'Shea against his wife, in which Parnell is a co-respondent. In the case of the Freeman's Journal, of Dublin, against the manager of which paper similar application was made, the court imposed a fine of £100, besides compelling him to pay the costs of the action.

An Important Case.

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.

The hearing of the case of the St. Catherine's Milling Company against the Dominion Government for breach of covenant was commenced in the Exchequer Court yesterday. The Company claims \$215,000 damages on account of the Government's failure to keep them in possession of certain timber limits in the disputed territory, which granted them in 1883.

Chartered Bank Notes.

MONTREAL, Jan. 18.

It is announced to-day, on good authority, that an agreement had been arrived at between the Minister of Finance and the bankers that the notes of chartered banks shall be accepted by each other in any part of Canada as currency, and a clause to that effect will be embodied in the Government's bill.

The Hull Riot.

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.

It is thought there will be no disturbance in Hull, but police from Montreal and this city will be on hand, and the 43rd Battalion will be in readiness to render any assistance necessary.

A Cronin Suspect Arrested.

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.

The Journal quotes chief of police Marsh as authority for the statement that a Cronin suspect known as Smith is under arrest. He is the man who drove Cronin to his death. The arrest was made last night at Little Rock, Ark.

Favorable Reports.

TORONTO, Feb. 18.

The Globe's cable says: "I hear favorable reports of the samples of two-rowed barley sent by Sir Charles Tupper for submission to experts who describe the grain as excellent and sure to find a market here at a good price."

The Treaty Ratified.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.

The Senate has ratified the British extradition treaty, with a few unimportant amendments.
