Speculation Spurred On Cabinet Makeup

In the aftermath of Monday's provincial general election, which returned the Progressive Conservatives to power, Premier Walter R. Shaw faces the problem of finding a replacement for Provincial Treasurer and Attorney-General Melvin McQuaid, the only cabinet minister who was defeated.

The premier indicated yesterday morning that Monday's election will be the last to be carried out under existing election legislation. "At the next session of the legislature," he said, the government will introduce an electoral reform act.

The report of a Royal Commission on electoral reform was tabled at the last session of the legislature and since that time the Conservative party has met in caucus to study it.

SECOND THOUGHTS
Giving some second thoughts on the election, the premier said "I am very pleased about it, as far as the government was concerned, we made no big promises, but depended on our record for the past three years, with a glance to the future, particularly in regard to resource development."

"I really think the people realize that the government means something very valuable to us, something very intimate to us, something we are used to, and I think it is important to establish through our resources development program, something with which the people of the province can work out their own destiny — an opportunity of working and earning for themselves."
