ATHLETICS DEN UNCED.—The Toronto Star says: Rev. Richard Hobbs, of London, cut loose at the Ministerial Association meeting there yesterday, and denounced all forms of sport, as inventions of the devil, skating, baseball, dancing, and even Y. M. C. A. athletic clubs being mentioned. Mr. Hobbs went so far as to say that 99 per cent. of the so-called recreation was dissipation. HILLSBOROUGH DAIRYING COMPANY.—The Hillsborough Dairying Company continues to do well. The price received for the butter they sent to Liverpool last December was 108, which netted the patrons 19.54. They paid 72.00 for November and December milk at a 3.9 test; and parties drawing their own supply of milk received 6 cents more or 78.09 per 100 lbs of milk. A dividend of 8 per cent has been paid on all paid up shares.

BIGGEST IN THE WORLD.—It is announced that the biggest building in the world is soon to be erected in the business centre of New York City, site not yet divulged, by the Merchants' Association of New York, an organization lately formed to promote New York business. It is proposed to inaugurate the new century by holding a great industrial exposition in the big building. Thereafter, to never, it is to remain as a permanent institution. The site will, it is said, cover eight city blocks connected by arcades, and the building will be at least sixteen times as large as Madison Square Garden, the converging streets and a street railway to traverse it. It is hoped to complete it by 1901, when the proposed exposition is to be held.


A BAD ACCIDENT.—The friends of Mr. Patrick McMahon, boiler-maker in the establishment of Bruce Stewart & Co., will hear with regret that he met with an accident yesterday which will disable him for several weeks. It seems that while a furnace was being removed from the machine shop to the boiler shop it rolled over and fell upon Mr. McMahon, cutting his left leg a distance of about five inches and through to the bone in places, besides fracturing a small bone near the ankle. Dr. Shaw was called in and did everything possible for the injured man before and after his removal to his home. Eight stitches had to be put in the cut, which is a short distance below the knee.

TO PURCHASE PALE TINE.—A movement has been started in Chicago with the object of raising sufficient money to purchase the land of Palestine from the Sultan of Turkey. The association has taken the name of Knights of Zion, and its membership is said to number more than a thousand. Branch organizations are being formed in other cities throughout the United States, and the nucleus of the fund has already been secured. The financiers of the association calculate the sum required to be raised is thirty million dollars. It is pointed out that the poor Jews of Russia and Galicia have a ready contributed two millions, and it is thought their more wealthy brethren in other countries can make up the balance without much difficulty. The Rothschilds and the great Russian banker, Posnansky, are said to be favorable to the scheme, which, if a fact, will give consistency to an ardent dream. The great difficulty, however, is that the Sultan has yet to be consulted. Of course he is desperately hard up.
