ADVANCE IN CHEESE.—An exchange says that cheese has advanced 1/4 to 3/8 of a cent in Montreal and is still on the rise.

FAST TIME.—The White Star steamer Doric, trading between London and New Zealand, claims it has made the fastest voyage around the world. The total time she steamed was 77 days, 6 hours and 50 minutes. The distance was 28,000 miles. The engine worked continuously.

NEW WAGON.—The Salvage Corps have just had a new wagon built for them by Mr. Hammond R. Large, which is a gem in its way. It is a good deal smaller than the one formerly used by the corps, and besides is much lighter and runs more easily. The workmanship throughout is excellent.

BABES IN THE WOODS.—On Thursday afternoon Lilly Moss and Walter Bontler, of St. Margaret's Bay, N. S., failed to turn up after school, and night coming on, search was made for them, but without avail. They were discovered next morning, asleep in the woods, in a hollow tree stump. When found they were locked in each other's arms. The children were only seven years old.

POLICE COURT.—One Scott Act case was further adjourned this morning, and a cruelty to animals case was dismissed. A lad named Geo. Brown, a son of the well-known tourist "Buckley" Brown, was fined 50 cents for quarreling with another lad about a jobster's claw on Market Square yesterday.

DROWNED IN A WATER CASK.—The Times says: George, the two-year-old son of Mr. Alex. McLean, Scotch settler, parish of Moncton, was drowned yesterday morning under peculiarly distressing circumstances. The child went out of the back door about 9 o'clock and some five minutes later his mother going out to look for him, found the body in a cask of water in the front yard. Life was quite extinct. It appears that the little fellow had got to the top of the cask and fallen in. Mr. and Mrs. McLean will have the sympathy of a large number of friends.

THE MAINE LIQUOR LAW.—Judging from the following, which is clipped from the Portland (Maine) Transcript, the Maine Liquor Law is no better enforced in that city than the Scott Act is here: "The number of liquor seizures for May, made by the police, was 48. The number of arrests for drunkenness was 100." The Transcript also states that at every Catholic church in the diocese of Portland a letter was read from Bishop Healy, on Sunday, June 8th, stating that the sacraments of the church would in the future not be administered to any person who engaged in liquor-selling on Sundays.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. The Halifax-Bermuda Cable.

HALIFAX, June 16.

The cable steamer Westmeath, which is to lay the cable between here and Bermuda, arrived here this morning. She left Bermuda on Thursday, and laid about ten miles of heavy cable to connect the office at Hamilton with the cable hut at Castle Harbor. The bottom was found to be very smooth and soft. The shore end here will be landed at the lumber yard near the direct United States cable. The steamer will commence laying in about a week, and will complete her work by the end of the month. The Westmeath left England on the 23rd of May.

Terrific Storm.

CINCINNATI, June 16.

Yesterday afternoon, a thunder-storm set in. One and a half inches of rain fell in less than an hour. The fire bells were kept constantly ringing by the electric batteries, and 3,700 fire alarm and telegraph wires were melted or otherwise killed. Edward Lanneham was washed into a sewer and drowned. The loss of property is heavy. The storm appears to have extended over a wide area. Eighteen houses were unroofed. In Covington, Bellevue, Dayton, and Newport, Ky., railway tracks were washed out, bridges swept away and thousands of acres of wheat laid flat.

Quebec News.

QUEBEC, June 16.

Le Courrier du Canada, Conservative, asks the followers of Sir Hector to vote for Mr. Heam, independent liberal, Quebec west.

It is said that Mgr. Labelle will continue to act as deputy minister of agriculture with the consent of the Pope in opposition to the expressed wish of the Bishop of Montreal.

The Bribery Commission.

BOSTON, June 16.

Before the House Bribery Committee of Investigation to-day, Lawyer Stevens counsel for the West End Company, stated that the company had given banquets to the members of the Legislature, and had furnished carriages to them, but had paid no money legitimately. The company believed their methods to obtain the charter were not wrong.

Terrible Gas Explosion.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 16.

A terrible gas explosion occurred at Hill Farm Mines, near Dunbar, at 10 o'clock this morning. Out of fifty miners working in the pit, but ten have thus far escaped. It is feared all the 40 still in the mines are either killed outright or have been suffocated. Private despatches to H. C. Frick of this city, say 45 men were in the mine, of whom 15 were rescued.

Stone Cutters on Strike.

LOWELL, June 16.

The stone cutters who work in the yards on monuments and similar work are on strike for nine hours a day and increased wages. Two firms, it is reported, acceded to their wishes, but the rest do not.

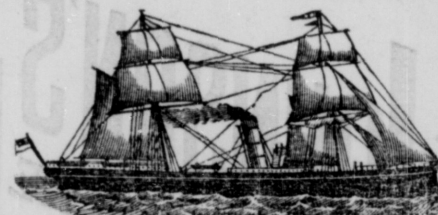

WALLACE CONFESES.—Young Robert N. Wallace, who, with Ignatius Lowitz, robbed his uncle, the editor of Wallace's Monthly of \$52,000 in bonds and money a month ago, and who was brought back from Havana by detectives last week, has made a full confession of his crime. He claims that he was urged to commit the theft by Lowitz, who had previously succeeded in having him cash worthless checks to the amount of \$250. This money came from the funds of the uncle for whom young Wallace was acting as cashier. Among other ventures they went into the book-making business at the races, dropping \$2,500 in a few days. The two fled to Havana, where they were arrested. It is understood that about half the money has been recovered.

HOME FOR TREATMENT.—A man named McDonald, about thirty-five years of age, was brought to the City Hospital on Saturday evening, on arrival here from Michigan. About eight months ago, Mr. McDonald, who belongs to Pisiquid, while working at bridge building in Michigan, was accidentally struck across the back with a heavy piece of timber, causing a fracture of the spine. Since that time he has been completely paralyzed from the hips down, and as helpless as an infant. Mr. McDonald was in the hospital at Michigan for about eight months, and was treated with but indifferent success. He is now placed on a water bed in the hospital here, and other suitable apparatus has been procured for him from the establishment of Mark Wright & Co. This water bed is something new in the Province, and was, we understand, imported expressly for this patient. Dr. Kelly, who is the physician in charge of the hospital this month, is giving the case the greatest possible attention, and has strong hopes of being able to bring the unfortunate man out all right through time.
