Finance Officials Sure Predictions Will Stand Up

Mr. Sharp told reporters the word he has personally received so far is that his budget has been well received. The Canadian Labor Congress praised it for reducing personal income taxes for those in the lower income brackets, about four out of 10 Canadians. This, the CLC said, was "a move in the right direction".

Jack M. Keith, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, said the budget "appropriately and realistically calls for some measures of restraint to bring about a better balance of supply and demand."

FORECASTS OFF MARK
From the point of view of federal budget impact on the economy as a whole, the forecasts made by ministers of finance in recent years have been wide of the mark.

Last spring, for instance, former-finance minister Walter Gordon set his tax and spending program on the expectation there would be a \$300,000,000 budgetary deficit. But the economy boomed along better than he and finance department officials anticipated, and the 1965-66 fiscal year is ending tonight with a deficit of only \$34,000,000.

Federal officials were asked Wednesday whether the new deficit forecast of \$150,000,000 in the budgetary accounts—and the \$615,000,000 surplus in the national accounts—was based on the same criteria as previous forecasts.

Union Names Representative In Rail Dispute

OTTAWA (CP)—Pat O'Neal, secretary of the British Columbia Federation of Labor, has been appointed union representative on the last of the three federal conciliation boards being set up to study a dispute between the railways and 108,000 non-operating employees.

Mr. O'Neal was selected by the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Transport and General Workers (CBRT) for the board established Tuesday by Labor Minister Nicholson to handle the CBRT's case on behalf of 22,000 workers.

Two boards were set up earlier in the disputes involving 55,000 workers in six non-union and 26,000 shop workers in 10 unions.

Union representative on both these boards is Harry Crowe of Ottawa, former CBRT research director now doing a project for the royal commission on bilingualism and biculturalism.

Gordon Cooper, Halifax lawyer, is the railway's nominee on both boards and is expected to become a member of the third board as well.

Mr. Cooper and Mr. Crowe have been unable to agree on a chairman for the boards and have asked Mr. Nicholson to stand in as a neutral arbitrator in a major railway dispute and the labor department is on the hunt for an experienced negotiator, likely a judge, to handle the job.
