

Ticats Top Ottawa 34-10; Legionaires Whip S'side Bombers Blast Roughriders

HAMILTON (CP) — Hamilton Tiger-Cats' tight defensive backfield started the scoring process and their bulldozing runners and pass artists finished them off Saturday as the defending B'g Four champions hammered Ottawa Rough Riders 34-10.

Four pass interceptions were the key moves in the Ticats' march to undisputed possession of first place through a sometimes-ragtagged clash in the wintling heat of Civic Stadium before a small crowd of 17,267.

Victories in all of their three starts left the Ticats two points up on Montreal Alouettes, whose only loss was to Hamilton. Toronto Argonauts have one win and Ottawa absorbed its third straight defeat.

Hamilton overcome an early 3-0 Ottawa lead with three touchdowns in the second quarter and two more in the third. With this fast margin, coach Jim Trimble set most of his bench-warming Canadians aside in the late stages, including quarterback Bobby Dawson.

Fullback Gerry McDougall scored on runs of one and 25 yards. New imports Billy Reynolds and Duane Wood picked up one each on running plays and Paul Dekker collected the other on a pass from quarterback Bernie Faloney. Steve Onestuk kicked four converts.

Ottawa's scoring was confined to Bobby Simpson's third-quarter touchdown on an end-zone pass from homebrew Russ Jackson,

and Mack Yoho's convert and game-opening field goal from 25 yards.

The passing attack of Rider quarterback Frank Tripucka bogged down against Hamilton's deep defence. Jackson, working option plays, was little better although he moved the ball well on the ground.

REGINA (CP) — Quarterback Jim Van Pelt and end Ernie Pitts set Western Interprovincial Football Union records Saturday, as Winnipeg Blue Bombers thrashed Saskatchewan Roughriders 61-3 to move into joint conference leadership.

Van Pelt threw seven touchdown passes and Pitts exploded through the Rider defence.

Previous WIFU highs were six touchdown passes by Jack Jacobs, then Winnipeg's quarterback, and four touchdown passes received.

The win snapped a two-game losing streak by the Canadian champion Bombers and moved Winnipeg into a first-place tie with Calgary Stampeders. Each has three wins. Riders have lost all four schedule starts.

Bud Grant's Bombers took a 7-0 lead in the first quarter, burst for five touchdowns in the second for a 41-0 lead at half time and added a touchdown in the third quarter for a 47-0 lead.

SINGLE TOUCHDOWN The only Rider touchdown came in the fourth quarter. Saskatchewan added a single to

make the score 47-8 before Bombers counted two more touchdowns.

Four of Pitts' touchdowns came on passes from Van Pelt and one on a pass from quarterback Ken Fleen. Fullback Charlie Shepard, halfback Ron Latourrelle, rookie Henry Jansen and fullback Gerry James accounted for the other Bomber touchdowns.

Latourrelle and Jansen scored their touchdowns on passes from Van Pelt. Shepard's came on a spectacular pass-and-run play that covered 82 yards. Van Pelt passed to halfback Leo Lewis who latgralled to Shepherd and big fullback rambled the remaining 65 yards unmolested.

ONE GROUND SCORE The touchdown by James was the lone Bomber score to come along the ground.

Van Pelt converted six touchdowns and was wide on two others. James booted the only convert he tried.

The Rider touchdown came when Don Allard, a new quarterback from Boston College, took over the controls from Bob Brodhead, another newcomer from Duke, and guided the club 58 yards in six plays.

Charlottetown's Junior Legionaires advanced to the island junior baseball finals with a double triumph over Summerside Juniors over the weekend.

On Saturday at Summerside, the Legionaires shaded the home-sters 7-5 and then followed that victory with a 8-0 blanking of the boys from Prince County on Sunday at Memorial Field, Charlottetown.

The Legion now meets the Peakes - Mount Stewart Juniors for the provincial championship. The King's County lads disposed of Charlottetown Abbies in two straight games.

Roger MacLeod was in complete control of the situation on Sunday. The lanky left-hander limited the Summerside boys to one base hit. Fidele DesRochea singled in the fourth, struck out eleven batters, walked only three and hit one batsman. He was in trouble only in the third when the first two men to face him got on base. Don Schurman drew a walk, Don McInnis was hit by a pitch but that's as far as Roger allowed the trouble to go. He retired the next three batters with out the ball getting out of the infield.

The Legion lads pounded the offerings of John Bethel for a

dozen base knocks. They put together five in the fifth inning when they sent four runners scampering across home plate. The winners picked up a pair of runs in the sixth and single tallies in the fourth and eighth.

GREAT SUPPORT The Legionaires gave MacLeod great support afield and came up with really top notch fielding. There was only one miscue on the winners' part and Roger made that himself when he failed to touch first after accepting

a throw from first baseman Harry Callaghan. The Summerside defence faltered on five occasions.

Roger MacLeod was also a big gun with the bat. The winning hurler got to Bethel for three singles in four trips. Wayne MacDonald had a double and two singles in five appearances and Harry Callaghan batted .500 with two for four.

Saturday at Summerside it was Little Lefty Dunn who got the win for the Charlottetownians. Lefty pitched seven and one

third innings before letting Roger MacLeod finish the chore. Garth Harris was the loser, giving way to John Bethel in the ninth inning. Phillips called the balls and strikes at Summerside and Willie Hennessey was on the bases. At Memorial Field it was Hennessey behind the plate and Donnie LeClair doing the base judging.

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Dunce Captures Derby Classic

NEW YORK (CP) — Dunce, three-year-old son of Tom Fool, belied his name Saturday when he raced to a 3 1/4-length victory in the \$155,625 American Derby at Arlington Park.

Dunce — who was just that in the Kentucky Derby, Preakness, Belmont and Jersey Stakes earlier in the year — became the 16th horse to win both the Arlington classic and the American Derby in the same year. His victory Saturday was worth \$93,700 to Claiborne Farm and brought his total earnings to \$244,570.

The 11-to-1 longshot Demobilize set the pace from the start and finished second. Little Tytus was third.

Dunce's time was 1:49 2/5 and his jockey Louis Cook. He returned \$8.60, \$6.20 and \$3.40. Demobilize paid \$8.90 and \$3.90 while Little Tytus was \$2.60. At Saratoga Springs, another son of Tom Fool, Tompon, took the winner's share of the \$114,475 Hopeful Stakes. With Willie Shoe-

maker in the saddle, Tompon overhauled the pace-setting Vital Force in the final one-sixteenth for a 1 1/4-length victory.

Tompon covered the 6 1/4 furlongs in 1:17 2/5 for his first stakes victory. He paid \$5.10, \$3.60 and \$3. Vital Force returned \$14.20 and \$9.60 and the third horse, Bourbon Prince, paid \$3.60.

HOW TO MARK YOUR BALLOT

1. On receiving your ballot, or ballots, proceed to the private compartment in the polling station.
2. Mark an X with black lead pencil (not pen) within the space between the dark lines containing the name of the candidate for whom you intend to vote.
3. Fold the ballot paper so that the initials and stamp on the back of it and the number on the counterfoil can be seen without opening it.
4. Hand the ballot paper, still folded, to the Deputy Returning Officer.
5. Remain until the Deputy Returning Officer places the ballot without unfolding it in the ballot box.

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
