Fredericton (CP)—Floods in central New Brunswick last April caused about \$565,000 damage, the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission reports.

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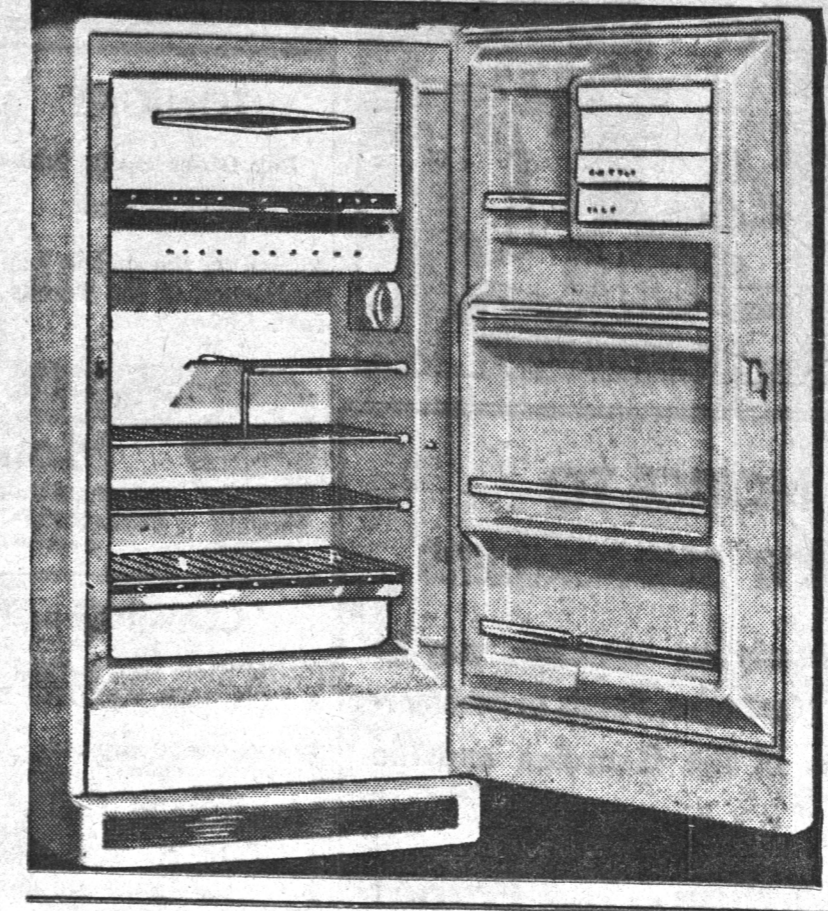
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
