FIRST METHODIST CHURCH.—Dr. Potts, of Toronto, General Secretary of the Educational Society of the Methodist Church of Canada, and one of the most famous pulpiter orators of America, is announced to preach in the First Methodist Church next Sunday evening and lecture on Monday evening.

MAKING MOUNTAIN DEW.—A large illicit still was seized in the mountains of Glendale, 20 miles from Port Hawkesbury, a few days ago by inland revenue officers from Toronto. A quantity of illicit whiskey was seized also. This makes three illicit still seizures made in Inverness this year.

A GOOD RESULT.—It is pleasing to hear that between \$800 and \$900 was realized at the catering in connection with the Provincial Exhibition. ANCIENT REMAINS FOUND.—While digging in a cellar at Sydney, O. B., one day last week, a workman found the skeleton of a man, together with a number of coins and gilt buttons. The coins date a hundred years back. What appeared to be a stone wall was also found underground. Possibly the remains were those of a soldier, and the presence of the buttons would indicate that he was buried in his uniform.

EVANGELISTIC SERVICES.—Mr. H. L. Gale, who is one of the leading evangelists of today, will be in Charlottetown this week and will conduct a series of special evangelistic services in the interest of the Young Men's Christian Association of this city. The first meeting will be held in Zion Church next Sunday afternoon at 3.45 o'clock. Mr. Gale will be accompanied by Mr. Greenwood, of Boston, who is spoken of as the leading Gospel singer on the globe.

HE NEVER CAME BACK.—A recently appointed Scott Act constable had a sad experience a few days ago at Joggins Mines. Meeting a man for whom he had a warrant, he promptly arrested him, and at the request of prisoner went with him to his house for a change of clothing. They went into the kitchen where the prisoner threw his hat on the table and asked the constable to wait there while he went up stairs to change his suit. SHOOTING AFFRAY.—A shooting affray which almost terminated fatally is said to have occurred at Cape North during the past week over the cargo of smuggled liquor alleged to have been landed at that place. It appears that some of the people of the district made an attempt to capture a quantity of the liquor, when McIntosh, who now claims the ownership of the entire cargo, procured a shot gun and fired several charges at the men, two of whom received serious injuries. If reports are true there will be lively times in that district before snow flies.—North Sydney Herald.
