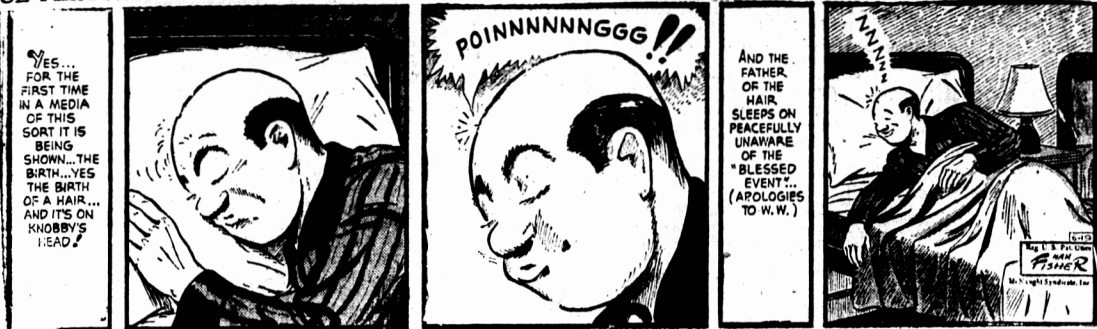

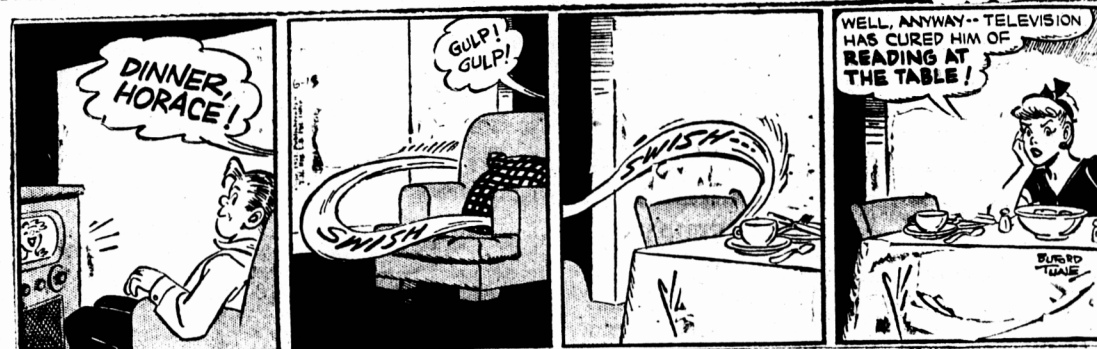

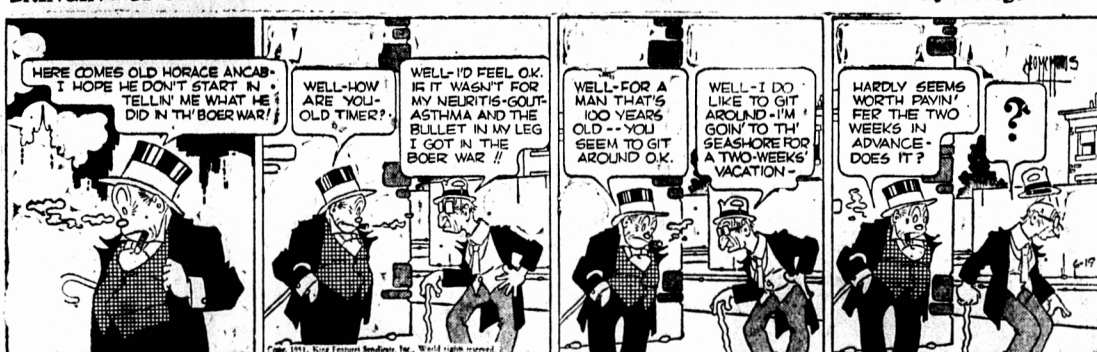

Contract Bridge

COMPARISON

It is always interesting to compare the step-by-step bidding of two expert pairs on the same hand in a team-of-four. For example:

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable. Total point scoring.

♠ A 9	♥ J 10 5 2
♦ A K Q 4	♣ 9 2
♠ 10 7 6	♥ K 8 4 3
♦ A K 8	♣ 7 5 4
♠ Q 8 6 4 3	♥ 10 8 6 5 3
♦ 7	♣ K 2
♠ 10 6 3 2	♥ Q 9 4

The opening lead did not matter — South could immediately claim all the tricks. The bidding at the other table was almost the same, but the difference was great enough to exert a profound effect on the final contract, and, as it happened, on the entire match:

This was the bidding at Table 1.

It was this South's jump in four hearts that was the key to the eventual grand-slam contract. North, knowing his partner's style of bidding, could be sure that South would not have jumped on a jack-high suit, merely five-cards long, and when North later ascertained, via Blackwood, that South had two kings, the grand slam became an excellent investment. North could count 12 top tricks, and the 13th could come from a spade ruff in North's hand if South had three spades, or from either the diamond or the club queen, or a possible seventh heart in South's hand.

The North player at the first table had to be conservative because, as far as he knew, South had only a five-card heart suit.
