MARRIED IN THE SNOW—The New Glasgow Chronicle says: The Jewish wedding as announced last week came off New Year's evening at 7 o'clock, on Marsh St. On each side of the street were strung a number of Chinese lanterns which gave the locality where the ceremony took place a cheerful appearance. The ceremony took place in the centre of the street, under a canopy held up by four sticks, the bride and groom standing in the snow. The rabbi from Halifax performed the ceremony according to the Jewish rite. A tremendous crowd of people witnessed the marriage, the largest number of invited and uninvited people, we venture to say, that ever attended a marriage ceremony in this country. The jam of people was something frightful; the ladies who took part in the ceremony were jostled around, and it seemed at one time as if someone would be injured. Those who were in the outside of the gathering showed very little respect, not to speak of manners, by the way in which they acted. After the ceremony was over the happy couple, with invited friends, repaired to their home, where a sumptuous marriage feast awaited.

CONCERT AND BASKET SOCIAL—Quite a number of people from the city drove up to Winslow yesterday afternoon to "take in" the concert and basket social for the benefit of the hall at that place. The choir of the First Methodist Church, assisted by some of our local talent rendered a programme of choruses and songs in a most pleasing manner. The songs were received with much applause by those present. Particularly good were the recitations by Miss Montgomery and the vocal selections by Messrs. Brenner and P. deC. Davies and Master Chas. Earle. In his selection, "The Cork Leg," Mr. Brenner fairly "brought down the house," as also did Master "Ted," by his capital rendition of "Sarah Jane." Both were encored. The second part of the entertainment consisted of the sale of baskets, which were rapidly bought up by the young men, some thirty being disposed of, bringing from \$1 to \$4 per basket. Messrs. L. E. CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening, Mayor Haviland presiding. Councillors Crabbe and Robertson were the only absentees.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, and a number of bills were ordered to be paid.

Mayor Haviland presented his Report for the year 1893, and in so doing complimented Mr. Davison, the City Clerk, for highly upon the activity and ability he had displayed in getting the accounts ready to be printed so quickly after the close of the year, and upon the excellent manner in which he had prepared his work.

Discussion on the Report was postponed until the next night of meeting.

Mayor Haviland presented a letter from Arthur Newbery, Clerk of the Executive Council, informing the Board that F. L. Hazard had been appointed Stipendiary Magistrate in the place of R. R. Fitzgerald, who had resigned.

His Worship also presented a letter from R. R. Fitzgerald, resigning the office of City Recorder. The resignation was accepted, and on motion of Councillor Beer, seconded by Councillor Taylor, F. L. Hazard was appointed Recorder at a salary of \$5 a year.

A letter from Macdonald & Martin, Barristers, regarding the claim of W. F. Best, analytical chemist, of St. John, for services in connection with the analysing of four samples of water from the city wells, was then read. Mr. Best wants \$60 for performing the work, and reporting thereon.

The matter was discussed at some length, and the communication was laid on the table pending further enquiry into the affair.

A communication was next read from John Power, stating that he had sustained injuries by reason of a defective crossing on Weymouth Street in November last, and claiming \$100 damages. The letter was accompanied by a certificate from Dr. Kelly regarding the injuries sustained by Mr. Power. The communication was laid on the table.

A memorial regarding the condition of the sidewalk from Grafton Street along Rochford Street to Brighton Road and along Brighton Road to the corner of Davies Street, was after some discussion, referred to the City Surveyor.

Councillor Hogan submitted tenders for the dredging of the dock at Queen's Wharf, and moved that the tenders be handed over to the Finance Committee with power to accept the tender of Alex. Macdonald for \$275, providing he gave the necessary security and performed the work according to plan and specification, and in the event of his not doing so, that the next lowest tender, that of John King, for \$1,200 be accepted. The motion was seconded by Councillor McKay and carried.

Councillor Beer moved that the salary of the Stipendiary be \$2,000, as heretofore, seconded by Councillor McKay.

Councillors Hughes and Taylor said they did not care for voting on the question of the Magistrate's salary just now, and argued that it was a matter which should be left for the incoming Council, as it might be an issue at the forthcoming election.

Councillor Beer's motion was then put and carried on the following division: Ayes—Beer, McKay, Hogan, Hooper. Nays—Hughes and Taylor.

A bill for \$165 from John P. Nicholson for superintending the repairs to Pownal Wharf was next presented and caused some discussion. A motion that it be paid was lost on the following division: Ayes—Hughes, Taylor. Nays—Hogan, McKay, Beer, Hooper.

Councillor McKay moved that a committee of three be appointed to present Mr. R. R. Fitzgerald, the retiring Stipendiary Magistrate with an address. The motion was seconded by Councillor Hogan and carried. Councillors McKay, Hughes and Beer were appointed members of the committee.

The Council then adjourned.
