NURSING STUDY

UNDER/ACT
The town of Montague is now under the provisions of the Town Planning Act. This was announced yesterday by Keir Clark, minister of municipal affairs. The town recently made application for the services of the Provincial Planning Board and for the provisions of the act and its regulations to apply within its municipal limits. This means in future building permits will be issued by the provincial town planning division and not by the town of Montague. Similar provisions also apply to the town of Georgetown and Alberton and should greatly facilitate the orderly development of the municipal areas and insure planning separation of commercial and residential zones.

Officer Cadets Are Selected

A total of 569 Canadian youths who have achieved university entrance standards this fall have been selected to be officer cadets of the navy, army and air force under the regular officer training plan of the Department of National Defence.

The following Island residents have been selected to take part in the program: G.E. Dawson, Carleton Place, CMR (RCN); K.I. Hamming, Meadow Bank, Prince of Wales College (Army); P.W. Somers, Kensington, CMR (RCAF); W.S. Richard, Charlottetown, St. Dunstan's U. (Army); J.R. Wonnacott, Charlottetown, Prince of Wales College (Army).

Of these 388 candidates are attending the three Canadian Services Colleges: 90 at Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont.; 130 at Royal Roads, Victoria, B.C., and 175 at College Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean, St. Jean, Que.

The other 174 sponsored candidates are attending civilian universities across Canada. Officer cadets are enrolled in the armed forces and provided with board, lodging and study material and paid a monthly allowance to meet incidental expenses during their college career.

They take military training during part of the normal summer holidays and must serve in the forces for three years after graduation as commissioned officers with a university degree.

Candidates selected for Royal Military College and Royal Roads must have senior matriculation, or equivalent, standing. Those enrolled at College Militaire Royal require their junior matriculation.

Candidates chosen for university subsidization must be acceptable to the university concerned in a course leading to a degree within four years for senior matriculants or five years for junior matriculants.

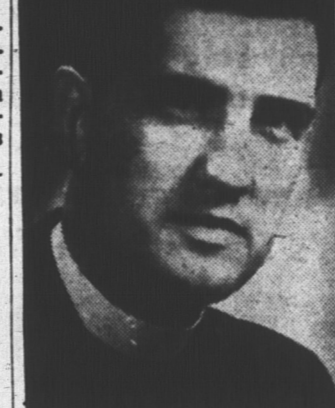

Blood Supply Is Reported Low

Figures released by the P.E.I. Red Cross yesterday reveal that so far this year, 3,360 units of blood have been required to meet the needs of patients in Island hospitals, as against the 3,427 units collected in the province in the three series held to date.

This leaves a precariously small balance of only 77 to carry the service along until the four days of clinics to be held next week at the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown with an objective of at least 1,140 donors.

Imprisoned For 34 Years, Man Waits Damages Appeal

GLENS FALLS, N.Y. (AP) — A former janitor who won a court order six months ago awarding him \$115,000 for 34 years' imprisonment after a \$5 theft, is seeking public welfare while he waits out an appeal by New York State.

Stephen Dennison, 37, applied for financial assistance last month after exhausting his unemployment benefits. Released from prison in late 1960, he worked at a Glens Falls plant until January, when he was laid off. Dennison said he has continued to seek work while his lawyer presses for a decision on the court-ordered, cash settlement.

"All I want is a chance to earn a living by obtaining a job I can handle," Dennison said. Dennison went to prison in 1926 for third-degree burglary. He was 16 and had stolen candy and marshmallows from a wayside stand.

Rusk-Gromyko Talk At Dinner

UNITED NATIONS, (AP) — U.S. State Secretary Dean Rusk invited Andrei A. Gromyko to dinner Thursday night to sound out the Soviet foreign minister on Viet Nam and a wide range of other issues.

On grounds that quiet diplomacy gets the best results, Rusk served advance notice on aides and correspondents alike that he would keep secrecy wraps around the outcome of his first such get-together with Gromyko since the two were at the United Nations General Assembly opening a year ago.

Barring an unforeseen flareup, the two are expected to meet again before Rusk returns to Washington Sunday.

Handcuffed, Admits Theft
OTTAWA (CP) — When Jean-Claude Viau walked into the station handcuffed early this week and asked suburban Eastview police to free him, they naturally smelled a rat. The police refused to take off the handcuffs until Viau, 23, told where he got them. The red-faced culprit finally admitted that he stole them from Ottawa city police a month earlier and accidentally handcuffed himself. A theft charge was withdrawn Wednesday. Magistrate Glenn Strike said a man had to be drunk or stupid to get into such a predicament.

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Town To Lease Police Vehicle

GEORGETOWN — Decision was reached at a special meeting of the Georgetown Town Council that the town would lease a new Ford four door car from McGowan Motors for police work in the town.

The lease covers a two-year period and under this method the town can easily budget for the costs involved.

Lease prices and purchase prices on cars and panel trucks were submitted from five automobile dealers. The council decided that to purchase a vehicle, the high insurance costs, registration costs, and unforeseen upkeep, plus the purchase costs would result in greater expenditure than under the lease plan, which is now being used by many towns and cities for police vehicles and by

Postal Union Gets Mandate For Strike

OTTAWA (CP) — Members of the Canadian Union of Postal Workers have given the national executive authority to order a strike if wage negotiations with the post office break down, union president William Kay said Thursday.

Mr. Kay said a count Wednesday of votes cast by 9,000 of the union's 11,000 members showed more than 85 per cent in favor of a strike if negotiations fall.

"We have a mandate to call a strike anytime after Oct. 1," he said in an interview.

Both the postal workers and the 9,000-member Letter Carriers' Union of Canada, which has set Nov. 15 as a deadline for a strike vote, are asking \$1 an hour more for the majority of members.

Mr. Kay said his union is asking \$1 an hour for all and an extra 16 cents hourly for mail handlers.

"If a good interim increase is offered, we will seriously consider it," he said.

A federal committee is working out an offer and is expected to present it early in October.

MAY EMULATE AFRICANS
CAIRO (Reuters) — President Makarios of Cyprus hinted Thursday that his country may also quit the Commonwealth should African member states take this step. The authoritative Cairo newspaper Al-Ahram quoted Makarios as saying in an interview that Cyprus would reconsider its attitude toward the Commonwealth if the Africans pulled out.
