Let's Talk It Over. Perhaps one of the most significant weak points of democracy (let us be thankful it has many strengths) is that a government, in order to stay in power, does not have to ensure the prosperity and contentment of a high percentage of the people, but rather only a majority. To take an extreme case, a government might neglect the interests of 45 percent of the nation, and yet theoretically be in no danger of being ousted from power as long as the other 55 per cent was satisfied. This is not to say that governments do abandon minorities entirely. There is sometimes enough inherent high-minded statesmanship in public men to strive to remedy the evils of poverty, lack of opportunity and discrimination where ever and whenever they see it, not for political purposes, but for the sake of the people themselves. But the democratic vote, which is supposed to be a good to ensure good government, really falls far short of accomplishing this end.
