THIRD PARTY CANDIDATES.—At a Third Party Convention at Pictou on Monday, W. D. Tanton, a former publisher of the Pictou News, and Samuel Archibald (Grit) were nominated as candidates to contest Pictou County for the House of Commons in the interest of prohibition. CHANGED HIS BELIEF.—Rev. J. F. Carney, formerly pastor of the Baptist church, North River, is now a resident of Mount Gilead, Ohio, and in charge of the Universalist church at that place. A local paper says that Mr. Carney is awakening an interest in church work among the young and becoming very popular with the people. FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Bonavista arrived here from Montreal, en route to St. John's, Newfoundland, at four o'clock yesterday afternoon, with a general cargo and one passenger. Captain Anderson reports encountering a heavy snow storm and hurricane during the passage. The Bonavista sailed again this morning with a cargo which included 37 sheep, 411 bush. oats and 34 rolls leather, shipped by William Boyle; and 60 lbs pork and 2 lbs bacon, by M. Rattenbury. BOSTON AND NEW YORK.—Those who are desirous of taking a trip to New York, with the privilege of stopping over at Boston en route will no doubt be pleased to learn that the International Steamship Company have arranged an excursion to Boston, and by way of the Fall River line, to New York. Commencing to-day, October 8, tickets will be issued until October 29, good for two weeks from date of issue, at the very moderate rate of \$7 for the round trip. A HANDSOME OFFICE.—Mr. Horace Haszard, the well known and popular merchant and insurance agent, whose advertisement appears elsewhere in THE EXAMINER, has removed to more central quarters in the Cameron Block, South Side of Queen Square. His new office is one of the largest in the city, and is fitted with all the modern improvements and conveniences. THE EXAMINER congratulates Mr. Haszard on his new departure, and wishes him continued success. FROM JAPAN. In a letter just received from Rev. Benj. Chappel, dated, "Aoyama Tokyo, 11 Sept," he says: "Osaka had a big fire a few days ago, from eighteen to twenty thousand burned, but Osaka has now had more cases of cholera than Nagasaki, 201 deaths the day before yesterday. Cholera is not increasing in Tokyo; yesterday only 68 new cases. We open school next Tuesday. There have been great floods throughout Japan as well as China; but there is a prospect of a good rice crop, which will be a great blessing to this people among whom there has been so much poverty. We are very well and in good trim to enter upon another year's work." A FATAL MISTAKE.—Says a New York despatch: A sad and fatal accident, the result of carelessness, occurred at Bellevue Hospital, New York city, last week. The physician in charge of a ward had ordered a drop of carbolic acid suspended in a dram of mucilage to be given a convalescing typhoid fever patient. In the course of the evening the nurse in charge of the ward went out, leaving the doctor's instructions to be carried out by one of the assistant nurses. By stupidity or ignorance on the part of the junior, he administered a dram of the carbolic acid to the patient, who shortly afterwards expired. The case is now before the courts; but as the dead man was poor, and has no friends to push the matter, it is presumed the careless parties will get off easily. SUPREME COURT.—The October term of the Supreme Court met at Summerside on Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock. Chief Justice Sullivan was on the bench. The Grand Jury returned "True Bills" against Wm. Curtis for larceny from a church, and against Kinch and another for assault. On motion Messrs. Kenneth J. Martin, A. A. Macdonald and A. H. McNeill were admitted to the bar. In the recent debtor case of D. Rogers vs. Owen Clarke, a verdict was returned for the plaintiff. Mr. Hodgson for plaintiff. TERRIFIC EXPLOSION.

PROPERTY DESTROYED.

Men and Women Killed and Wounded.

WILMINGTON, Del., Oct. 7. The Dupont powder mills, on Brandywine Street, about three miles from here, blew up this afternoon, and the whole section known as the upper yard is a complete wreck. One magazine went off first. The rolling and drying mills near by were set off by the concussion followed in rapid succession by seven distinct successive explosions. Every dwelling in the neighborhood was wrecked or unroofed, and all buildings within a radius of half a mile were more or less injured. Nine men and one woman were killed and several others are missing. Five men are wounded, one girl, two years old is seriously injured. Some fifty houses, inhabited by employes of the company are completely wrecked. Six mills are in ruins. Many windows were broken in Wilmington. The dead are all employes of the company and were in and about the mills that exploded. LATER. About fifty families are rendered homeless. The dead number eleven men and one woman.

INTO THE RIVER.

Another Fatal Landslide.

QUEBEC, Oct. 7. A landslide occurred last evening at St. Pierre Riviere du Sud by which a house and barn were forced into the river and the wife of the owner was killed instantly. Her husband had both legs broken. There is no news yet concerning the other occupants of the house.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7. The Department of Agriculture to-day forwarded to England samples of Canadian-grown barley for display at the twelfth national exhibition of barley under the auspices of brewers and malsters of Great Britain. Although the Government only two or three days ago received an intimation of the exhibition, a fairly representative collection of two-rowed barley, grown in Canada this year, has been sent. Hon. C. H. Tupper has received a beautiful silver trowel from the directors of the Chignecto Ship railway, in commemoration of his having laid the corner stone of their dock a month ago.

England's Ultimatum.

LISBON, Oct. 7. England has demanded of the Portuguese Government an immediate settlement of its claims to indemnity for the seizure of the British American Lakes Company's steamer James Stevenson, illegally captured by Lieut. Contindo, a few months ago.

The Ulunda.

HALIFAX, Oct. 7. The steamer Ulunda will leave Westport to-morrow for Halifax. The vessel is now perfectly dry. She will proceed to Halifax under her own steam. Capt. Kelly is in charge. She will go into the dry dock.
