This misfortune so preyed upon him that he became very melancholy and sensitive but was looked upon as harmless. A little over a year ago however he took a turn for the worse and was at times very violent. Becoming unmanageable at home, it was decided to place him in the Hospital for the Insane, and for that purpose he was brought to town this morning. He was handcuffed and his arms tied up with ropes in the station, where much sympathy was expressed at his sad condition. He will likely be placed in the Hospital this afternoon.

New Brunswick Elections

THE RESULT.

St. John, N. B., April 27.
The result of yesterday's contest, so far as received up to an early hour this morning, are given below.
York elected the whole Government ticket.
Westmoreland, three Opposition and one Government.
Northumberland sends Hon Mr. Adams and three associates against Mr. Blair.
Kings sends three Government men.
Sunbury elects Glasin and Harrison, defeating both Opposition candidates.
Queen's probably returns her old team, Hetherington and Palmer.
Carleton took all her weight on the side of the York Syndicate.
Gloucester returns an Opposition man.
Malawaska returns Theriault, and Victoria Mr. Baird.
Charlotte, it is said, elects Hon. Mr. Lynott and three on the Government side.

HOME RULE.

Lord Hartington's Hope.

LONDON, April 26
Lord Hartington in a speech in Lancashire this evening said no alterations would remove the objections to the Irish Scheme. He hoped with the assistance of Chamberlain, Trevelyan, Goschen, Sir Henry James, Mr. Bright, Earl Shelborne, Derby, and the Duke of Argyll to create an independent party, or induce the withdrawal of the measure.

Loyalist Meeting.

DUBLIN, April 27.
A loyalist meeting was held at Mayo to-day, and some violent speeches made. Mr. Joyce, the Conservative member, moved that the Irish Loyalists refuse to recognise the Dublin parliament if established, and decline to pay taxes. He said he intended to draw up a list of those who were prepared to bear arms.

Terrible Railway Accident.

ATCHISON, Kan., April 26.
A train on the Missouri Pacific, on which the great strike has lasted many weeks, was thrown off the tracks last night, killing the fireman and brakeman, and seriously injuring the engineer. Vice-President Noxie has offered a reward of \$2,500 for the arrest of the wreckers.

Terrible Tragedy

KEYPORT, N. J., April 26.
In a house near here this morning, the wife of J. M. Smith, in a fit of insanity, deliberately attacked her four children with an axe, killing one outright and injuring the others so that they cannot recover.

Sympathy with Gladstone.

WASHINGTON, April 26.
In the House to-day, a resolution was offered expressing sympathy with Gladstone in his efforts to secure a free Parliament for Ireland.

The Spanish Elections.

MADRID, April 26.
The Spanish senatorial elections resulted in return of 128 Ministerialists, 28 Conservatives, six Independents, 4 Republicans, and 2 members of the Dynastic list.

Election in Italy.

ROME, April 26.
The Chamber of Deputies is dissolved, and a general election for members of the new Chamber will be held May 23rd.
