GEORGETOWN — The Water front here presented a bustling scene over the weekend as the railway wharf docking space was at a premium.

The Gulf Gull last dragged to be completed at the ship yard of Bahadur Marine Ltd. in New Brunswick, arrived in Georgetown several days ago and on Sunday sailed for Pitou, N.S., where she will go ashore to have the launch, clear removed and other work done. This is standard procedure in a newly launched and finished dragger.

The dragger Polar Fish was tied up here for a week and is expected to sail soon for the Magdalen Islands.

Also berthed at the railway wharf are the two dragger work boats the Gulf Gallant and the Gulf Guard. Workmen are engaged and will be for some considerable time, working on both boats as they have to be fitted out here with all electrical, carpentry, and pipe fitting work.

## Purpose Of Jr. Red Cross Outlined By Nat. Director

Ralph Wendeborn, BA, BEd., national director of the Junior Red Cross was special guest speaker at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club held in the Charlottetown hotel yesterday. Brigadier W.W. Reid was chairman and Dr. Kenneth Parker, chairman of the provincial Junior Red Cross advisory committee was co-chairman.

Mr. Wendeborn prefaced his remarks on the Junior Red Cross with a vivid account of the origin and development of the

## Red Cross movement which today finds the organization represented by 102 societies in the world, "entirely divorced from politics, religion or racial barriers".

The criterion of the Red Cross is "need—people helping people beyond themselves—work together and share, when aware of other people's need," t h e speaker said.

"Organize and train young people for a t i o n is the immediate objective of the Junior Red Cross, training them now to develop their potentialities with an outlook to the future," the speaker stated. Young people in 102 countries of the world are progressively learning of the needs of others and are endeavoring to do something about it.

## MILLIONS HUNGRY

"Two-thirds of the people in the world go to bed hungry every night and 10,000 people die every day because of the lack of medical attention," Mr. Wendeborn stated.

The problem in Canada is that group-society needs too much and reaches out for it. Canada has become self-sufficient and "what's in it for me" appears to be a factor he said. Starting at grade one and continuing up to grade 12, Junior Red Cross activities are directed towards developing mature and responsible citizenship.
