WEDNESDAY, Dec. 10.—Friedrich Ailshin, Krummhaier, a German theologian, an ardent priest, published "Elijah the Tishbite," 1828. "Elisha," 1837. Virtued Great Britain, 1856, and died the 10th Dec., 1868. It was on the 10th of Dec., 1870, that the German parliament, in an address requested the King to become Emperor. The votes stood 188 for, and 6 against, assuming the title.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

Sir John's Arrival.

OTTAWA, Dec. 9. Sir John arrived here to-day. He received and replied to an address from the Liberal-Conservative Association and was escorted to his residence by a large body of citizens.

In his reply he said he had met with the kindest reception from public men and all political parties in England, and that the first intimation he had received of Her Majesty's intention to confer an honor on him was contained in a note from Mr. Gladstone, that "in a consideration of your long and distinguished services in Canada, Her Majesty desires to confer upon you the honor of G. C. B."

Sir John said the feeling in England with respect to Canada was very strong, and we were no longer considered an incumbrance or a trouble to the empire; on the contrary, both great parties who now govern the destinies of England are rivaling each other in their support of the idea of a federation of the empire.

The Imperial Federation Associations were confining themselves to the collection of information and educating the public mind as to the best methods of strengthening the ties which bind the colonies to the mother country.

Work of the Dynamiters.

NEW YORK, Dec. 9. The Graphic prints the following London despatch:—"Government authorities continue to receive alarming information as to the working of dynamiters. Sentries at Windsor Castle have been doubled, and effective measures have been taken for protecting all members of the royal family from outrage. Guards at the government buildings and railway stations have also been increased, and the Scotland Yard detectives are displaying unusual activity. It is rumored that the real cause of this display of cautionary measures by authorities is that a large quantity of dynamite is missing from one of the Nobel Dynamite Co's depots."

O'Connell vs. Sackville.

DUBLIN, Dec. 9. The Council at a meeting last night by vote of thirty-one against twelve, resolved to change the name of Sackville Street to O'Connell Street. A deputation of tradesmen appeared at the meeting and protested against their action, whereupon T. D. Sullivan, M. P., warned them that they were opposing the wishes of the Irish people. This was construed as a threat to boycott them. The tradesmen are raising a fund to test the legality of the action of the corporation.

Graving Dock At Halifax.

LONDON, Dec. 9. Earl Northbrook, first Lord of the Admiralty, gave an audience to-day to a deputation of shipping merchants, who made proposals for the construction of a graving dock at Halifax. The matter has been referred to the British Admiral commanding at Halifax. The capital necessary for the construction of the dock has been subscribed, subject to the final decision of the Admiralty, which Lord Northbrook intimated would be favorable.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Dec. 9. In the Supreme Court to-day the Exchequer appeal of the Halifax Street Railway against the Queen was heard. Judgment was reserved.

Land grant bonds of the C. P. R. to the extent of over two millions, were cancelled in Montreal yesterday.

Over nine millions have thus been cancelled since their issue.

Captain Dudley's Fate.

LONDON, Dec. 9. Captain Dudley and the mate of the wrecked yacht Mignonette, who were found guilty of murder in killing the boy Parker for food, were to-day sentenced to death. It is believed that they will yet be pardoned.

U. S. Politics.

NEW YORK, Dec. 9. Senator Bayard, of Delaware, paid the President-elect, Cleveland, a mysterious visit on Saturday, and it is reported he has been offered the position of Secretary of State.

A Nihilistic Decree.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 9. The Nihilist executive has issued a manifesto condemning Count Folstoi, Minister of the Interior, to death.
