Micah prophesies an international recognition of God and universal peace "in the latter days" which will give the world a new security.—Micah 4:1-5. MEMORY VERSE:—"Blessed are the peacemakers; for they shall be called the children of God."—Matthew 5:9.

Jesus tells Peter to abundantly forgive others' sins and forbids the use of the sword to enforce belief in Christianity.—Matthew 18:21; 26:50-52.

Paul's letter to the Roman Christians emphasizes the need for living in peace and tells them how, as Christians, they can achieve it.—Romans 12:14-21.

Paul writes to Timothy stressing prayers for kings and rulers in order to bring God's blessings on the nation as a whole.—Timothy 2:1, 2.

CHRISTIAN EXAMPLE

Peace Will Come Through Christ

Or to single Christian — or to Christian church, or any nation — can, by their efforts, bring about a permanent world peace, each one can live at peace with one another, setting an example for the non-Christian seven-eighths of the world to follow.

This unbelieving majority, naturally, determines in a very world conditions. But world peace will come, brought in by the Lord Jesus Christ. And it

will be accompanied by worldwide acknowledgment and worship of God, as today's lesson points out.

The first three chapters of the book of Micah consist primarily of his denunciation of Jewish heresies, worldly priests and greedy aristocrats. But, Micah prophesies, in the latter days all nations and peoples will voluntarily come to the house of God to learn the way and will of God, and a powerful, universal proclamation of the Word of the Lord will bring about a true, abiding peace. As a result, the world will have a security it has never known before.

The third verse of this passage (Micah 4:1-5) is a favorite with many enthusiasts for hu-

man schemes for world peace. Over and over we hear sermons preached from this passage, encouraging us to enter vigorously into various humanly conceived schemes. Naturally each of us should do what we can for peace; but the universal peace promised here will come only when its conditions are met.

Jesus, Himself, repeats this in the passage taken from Matthew's account of Jesus' betrayal in the Garden of Gethsemane. Christ emphasizes that His arrest and coming condemnation are part of God's plan, and Peter should not try to avert it through the use of his sword.

In its own right the sword may be used to defend nations against oppression, or to prevent confusion, plunder and rape upon the earth. But it cannot be used in the propagation and maintenance of the Gospel. Christianity is not to be enforced by bloodshed and Christian belief cannot be extorted by force.

In the chapter from his letter to the Roman Christians assigned to today's lesson, Paul defines the rules of conduct which they — and we — must observe as Christian members of human society.

We should ask God's blessings on those who persecute us for when we bless our persecutors, we are unable to curse them.

To rejoice with the joyful and have sympathy for the sorrowful is a universal and unconditional command; not a matter of taste or sentiment, but of conscience.

We should live in harmony with our fellow Christians, for this spirit can co-exist despite

great differences in other matters.

We are not to retaliate on those who do us an ill-turn, for Jesus has admonished us to forgive abundant and to forgive our enemies.

As far as possible we should live peacefully with all men including unbelievers as a society.

We should not attempt vengeance upon those who have injured us, for God will exact justice from wrong-doers.

We should try to win our enemies with kindness, for thus our vengeance becomes a victory of love.

We are to resist evil and seek to overcome it with good, both a warning and an admonition.

Paul's final rule for Christian conduct, in 1 Timothy 2:1-2, is to pray for all men and expect prayer for kings and those in high places, that our lives might be tranquil, quiet, godly and reverent.

Prayer for the rulers of a nation began in the days of the prophets, those things which will bring God's blessings upon the nation as a whole.

Claim Amish Fathers Break School Laws

CAMDEN, Mich. (AP)—The Amish, a gentle folk who cling to the traditions of centuries, have come into sharp conflict with the rules of the modern day world in this farming community.

Eleven Amish fathers of 52 school children are charged with violating Michigan's compulsory school attendance law, although the children have attended classes in a pair of one-room schoolhouses.

In an appearance before Justice of the Peace Alfred Wagner last October, the Amish pleaded not guilty and asked for a jury trial, now expected in June.

The conflict revolves around the fact that 19-year-old Jerome Dalagrane and 17-year-old Ruth Graber have been teaching classes in the two schools. Since neither were certified, the eighth grade—as is the Amish custom—neither has been certified by the state.

Thus, in the view of the prosecution, the 52 Amish children are in effect not attending school at all.

The Amish, pillars of the soil who believe in the supremacy of the Bible, spurn such modern conveniences as electric lights and automobiles.

WORLDLY TEMPTATIONS

The parents — fearing their youngsters were being exposed to worldly temptations — purchased two one-room school houses and had them moved onto Amish farms. At times, non-Amish certified teachers handled the classes, but none has been certified recently.

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Spiritual Dieting Needed by People

In answer to a questionnaire on the subject of spiritual dieting, a woman recently wrote: "Lay people have to become holy and should strive for perfection as much as a religious."

"In fact, the problems of a lay person's life are so complex that he has a special need for a spiritual director. Otherwise religion can continue to be a separate and uninteresting part of his life and a mediocre one at that."

A man writes that one needs a spiritual director "to help him stand back and look at the crowded scene of everyday life through God's eyes."

In the question of the choice of a director there must be great latitude. The need for clergyman schooled in the spiritual life is great even at the same time have an understanding of the practical realities of marriage and family.

One husband puts it: "Married people particularly need a director who does not know much about the nature and goal of the supernatural life to give good direction."

What is badly needed these days are clergy who combine knowledge of both theory and practice.

One question which arises is what you discuss with a director? The answer would be many phases of life including the life of prayer, large decisions, spiritual problems and the practicing of virtue.

As a matter of fact, every thing concerning one's spiritual and moral behavior as well as important decisions that might have to be made could be included.

The frequency of direction as well as the matters to be discussed will vary from person to person.

The director, in general, works with what the person gives him.

BEHAVIOR

Beginners in the spiritual life, those involved in choosing a vocation, or in a more external crisis or great interior trial, may need more lengthy and more frequent direction than those whose life at present has a greater degree of stability.

The whole, spiritual direction is a completely unexciting experience. People can't expect miracles. If they should they are discouraged if they don't see any immediate results.

Like everything else in the Christian life they must plug along in it.

It seems evident that "the desire for sanctity" is the necessary qualifications to have a spiritual director that such instruction is one of the normal means to grow in union with God is a relative necessity.
