Quite recently I drove over the Seven Mile Road and then turned left, toward Annandale, at Dundas. I first used the highway in the early twenties when I drove a Grey, Dort Roadster. My sister Vick lived at Annandale in those days. What a road that was. There were sections of masonry on the Seven Mile known as "Ordinary Road" where long sections were covered with potholes. The mud and dirt had long since disappeared and even at five or six miles per hour one's head would be bumping the hood. I'll never forget a hill near Cumberland School. It was short and steep with a foot or eighteen inches of sand at its foot mixed with round stones the size of foot balls. Today it's covered with high grade pavement smoother than some city streets. It was the late George E. O'Brien who put Annandale on the map of the province. May his memory never fade.
