**THE PRODUCTION OF WHEAT.**

Explanation of How the Presenting it  
to the Market has been caused.

We have referred to the great over-  
production of wheat in recent years as  
the immediate cause of the tremendous  
fall in prices; but it remains to explain  
how the wheat has been produced. That  
it is due to the bounty of nature rather  
than to the enterprise of man is clear  
from the fact that it is mostly attrib-  
utable to production in the United States,  
where the wheat area has decreased dur-  
ing the last ten years, while the popu-  
lation has been augmented by about  
125 millions. In 1884 there were  
nearly 300 million acres under wheat in  
that country, while the average area  
during the three years ending with 1893  
was under 275 million acres, and this  
year it is estimated by the department  
of Agriculture at only 270 million acres.  
But the yield was phenomenal in 1891,  
extraordinary in 1892, and it was up to  
average in 1893 and 1894. It is certain  
that the crops of 1891 and the two fol-  
lowing years were greatly overestimated  
by the Department of Agriculture.  
What has been learned of the distribu-  
tion of these crops appears at least  
15,000,000 quarters over the average  
annual production of the three  
preceding years. This season's crop,  
again, according to all commercial esti-  
mates, is quite up to an average in  
quantity, and much greater than the  
figures of the Department of Agricul-  
ture intimates.

It is this superabundance in America  
there is to be added a new one in the  
Argentine Republic, where over two  
million quarters of wheat were exported  
in 1892, and over four and a half  
millions in 1893, while this year's total  
is expected to reach seven million quar-  
ters. From 1890 to 1893 that country had  
only in one year exported as much as a  
million quarters, and the rapid increase  
of her surplus, coming on top of the  
extra exports from the United States,  
good crops in Europe since 1891, and  
great crops in India since 1892, has natu-  
rally helped to bring prices down, to  
Argentina having the only wheat crop  
of a country in which the growth of  
wheat has greatly extended in recent  
years. Argentine statistics are likely  
to be true, as they are based on the fact  
that she is to be relied on to show that  
the wheat area, which was only 40,000  
acres in 1880, had expanded to 600,000  
acres in 1893. In spite of the low price  
ruling since the crop of the latter year  
came into the market, a great increase  
in wheat growing is reported for the  
present year.

The explanation of this surprising ad-  
vance in wheat production given by  
Argentine authorities and the British  
representative at Buenos Ayres, is that  
it is due partly to the high gold pre-  
mium which has prevailed for several  
years, and partly to the settlement of  
the country by a large number of Italian  
immigrants, who are content to labor  
from sunrise to sunset, and even by  
moonlight, for a bare living. They  
spend hardly anything, it is said, upon  
improvement, and, in addition, the gold  
premium makes clear, while they sell  
their wheat at gold prices, and pay their  
other expenses in the depreciated  
paper currency, which is said to be al-  
most as low as ever in payments which  
they have to make.

If this is to be taken as the main ex-  
planation of Argentine farmers being in  
a position to extend their wheat industry  
when prices are unremunerative, it  
grows in nearly all other countries,  
their enterprise is built on a very in-  
secure foundation. English farmers, at  
any rate, cannot grow wheat at 2s. a  
quarter. A thirty Scotch farmer in  
Essex a few years ago astonished the  
owners of an agricultural paper by giving  
figures to show that he could grow  
wheat at a profit to sell at 3s. a quarter;  
but he disposed of the straw as well as  
the grain, and he still holds to his  
claim. It is incredible that the world  
can long be supplied with wheat  
at a price which will induce a series of  
"lean years" occur to cause a series of  
"fat years," it will, in all probability,  
be brought about by a considerable in-  
crease of the wheat area.—London Econo-  
mist.

From time to time the rumor is re-  
vived that the Nana Sahib, the most  
notorious monster of the Indian mutiny,  
is still alive. In relation to one of these  
reports, Major-General Hutchinson of  
the British Army, says in a letter to the  
London Times: "In 1857-58 I was mili-  
tary secretary to the chief commissioner  
of Oude, and as such was head of an in-  
telligence department which supplied to  
the military authorities and to the su-  
preme government information regard-  
ing the movement of rebel troops. The  
system adopted was to send out run-  
ners with instructions to pass through  
certain lines of country, returning to  
Lucknow, and to report everything they  
heard. It was so arranged that the  
runners, without knowing it, would cross  
each other at certain points at about  
the same time. They were never told  
what particular information to inquire  
for. Some time in 1858, probably about  
June or July, three of the runners,  
coming from different directions, sepa-  
rately reported that the Nana Sahib had  
died of fever across the River Gogra,  
and been burnt in the jungles border-  
ing on Nepal and known as the Terai.  
This information, according to the in-  
structions of the chief commissioner, I  
reported to Major-General Hutchinson,  
and Robert Montgomery, a British officer  
of the same rank, who was at the time  
in Lucknow. As the Nana up to date  
had not been discovered, it is, I think,  
now highly probable that the rumors  
of his death are true, and certainly  
it was then considered so to be by the  
Intelligence Department, of which that  
very able and every reliable officer, the  
late Major Orr, was the executive com-  
roller."
