Congratulations are due today to both the senior and junior track and field squads of the Charlottetown Abegweit Club for their fine performance here Saturday in the winning of top honors in the Maritime Invitation Track and Field Meet. The boys put on a wonderful show in both departments, but contrary to general belief, it was the field division who really put the team over the top for their final 88 to 50 point win over an aggressive six-man team from the Wanderers Amateur Athletic Club of Halifax.

But it is not only the Abbies who are deserving of much credit. Every man who took part in the meet was a credit to the club or district he represented. Performing under weather conditions that were enough to daunt the stoutest heart, rain and mud predominating, the boys gave it everything they had through the entire meet to come up with exceptionally good times and distances under such unfavourable conditions.

And all the credit doesn't go to the contestants either. Wet through to the skin, the presiding judges and officials took the rain and discomfortableness with the rest, to make an excellent job of conducting the meet and running it off in almost record time, without a hitch or a complaint. It wasn't a meet that saw many records broken, although there were some, but was certainly one that set an all time high for grim determination, stamina, good sportsmanship and fellowship.

Although the meet didn't enjoy the large representation of outside the province athletic clubs as in former years, with the meet developing into pretty much a lone battle between Abbies and Wanderers, plus the competition from independent entries from Shediac, N. B. and Lennox Island, it was nevertheless a keenly contested one every inch of the way.

Considering the fact that they only had a six-man team competing, the Wanderers Club made a splendid showing against the much larger Abbie aggregation, and if it had been left to their track prowess alone, would have finished on top of the heap. Lead by a fleet-footed Bill Haley and Keith Fancy, they overhauled the Abbies in the dash events, with the exception of the 440 yard event, and augmented by smart performances by John Martin over 880 and one mile runs, really kept the Abbies busy trying to keep up their point standing.

Powerful performances by team-captain George Walters, and his supporting field team of Tom Pendergast, Jim Steele, Barry Beers, Ernie Matheson, Wendell Barrett, Don Large, Cullen Delorie and Bob Jay, however, more than made up for their point deficit before the final count was tallied.

The track division, despite the fact that they were eclipsed in some events by the Halifax Club nevertheless held up their end of the point winning honors. Johnny Cash and Bob Jay cornered the market in the 440 senior events with first and second places, with Cash also picking up thirds in the 100 and 220 events, while John Paul broke his own six-mile field record in winning that event with Russell Doyle taking thirds in both the mile and six-mile events. Wendell Barrett, Cullen Delorie, Don Large and Lorne Burke also made impressive performances in the junior dash events and the mile run.

The senior Abbie relay teams also came through with winning performances when they copied off first and third place honors in the mile contest against a second place Wanderers team. The winning Abbie relay was composed of Bob Jay, Dave Boswell and Jackie Brown.

Abbies Take Top Honors In Maritime Invitation Track And Field Meet

The Charlottetown Abegweit senior and junior track and field squads captured top honors over the runner-up Halifax Wanderers team at Memorial Field here Saturday afternoon in the holding of the 3rd annual Maritime Track and Field Championships.

Competing in an almost continuous downpour of rain that made it tough going in both the track and field departments, the Abbies rolled up a senior team total of 88 points against a total of 50 for Wanderers, while the Abbie Junior squad compiled a total of 33 points and the Wanderers garnered a total of 21 points. It was the second year in a row that the senior Abbie team have won the event over other Mainland clubs.

The games were under the sponsorship of the Department of Physical Fitness in co-operation with the Abegweit Amateur Athletic Association.

George Walters, competing team captain for the Abbies, won the best all-around senior athletic trophy with a total of 21 points, while Keith Fancy of Wanderers was runner-up with 14 points. Bill Haley and John Martin of the Halifax Wanderers Club tied as high point winners in the junior event with 10 points each, while Wendell Barrett of Abbies was second with six points.

An 18-man team from Halifax Navy (H. M. C. S. Stadacona) was unable to compete in the meet when bad weather conditions grounded their plane at Halifax.

Due to the soggy condition of the grounds, which towards the latter part of the meet developed into mud and deep pools of water, the meet was not one for breaking records. One did fall however, when John Paul of Abbies, knocked ed 25 seconds off his own record set here last year in the six mile run, and Bill Haley of Wanderers equalled the junior 100 yard dash record of 10-3-5, set by Jack Brown of Abbies two years ago.

The weather didn't dampen the ardour of the contestants, who despite the unfavourable conditions, carried out the meet to a complete success in every department.

Following the conclusion of the meet, the contestants and officials were the guests of the Department of Physical Fitness at a special and delightful banquet held at the Grand Hotel, Marshfield, Saturday evening, and later were also the guests of the Department at a dance at Holy Name Hall.

Attending the banquet as special guest and patron of the meet, His Honor Lieut. Governor J. A. Bernard extended a warm welcome to the visiting athletes and congratulated both the competitors and officials for an excellent performance despite the adverse weather conditions, and then made the official presentation of trophies and prizes to the winning athletes.

Brigadier W. W. Reid, Director of Physical Fitness, presided at the banquet and also extended his thanks and appreciation for the fine sportsmanship and management of the entire event. Other speakers at the function, who all tendered their congratulations to the athletes for the splendid way in which they carried on under such unfavourable weather, were Lt. Col. W. J. MacDonald, W. E. Scantlebury and George Francis.

Roy Wouters Retains Title In Easy Decision

GLACE BAY, N.S., July 2—(CP)—Roy Wouters, hard-hitting Montreal middleweight, successfully defended his Canadian title here Saturday night before 6,000 spectators, winning an easy 12-round decision over George "Rockabye" Ross, the former title-holder from Westbay Road, N.S.

It was the 26-year old Wouters second victory over Ross within two months. He scored a tenth round T.K.O. to win the title from the Cape Bretoner in Halifax May 6. Previously Ross had held sway over Canadian middleweights for two years.

Both fighters scaled an even 154 pounds. Using an authoritative left hook in the inside fighting, Wouters was never in trouble against the light jabbing and tiring Ross. Stalking forward and blocking Ross's best shots, the Montrealer won his opponent's defence away by the midway mark and had an easy target for a short left hook and a right cross.

There were no knockdowns.

Record Crowd

A cut over Ross's left eye opened in the sixth, but following the pattern set from the start, the challenger ducked in close and showed no desire for stand off fighting with the upstart champion. Almost defenceless in the last three rounds, Ross battled back gamely but without any zip to his punches to draw roaring approval from the largest indoor crowd here to witness a boxing match here.

Wouters Shows No Marks

In the dressing room, Wouters showed no marks and breathed easily. He said that none of Ross's punches had hurt him. Commenting on future plans, manager Rene Chauvin said that a Montreal bout with Johnny Greco was in prospect.

Ross, showing a puffing about the left side of his face, said in his quarters Wouters had shaken him up several times. He was anxious for further matches with the champion but said that he was content to work up the ladder again into the leading contender's position.

Gordon (Gramps) Kiley, 138, of Sydney, N.S., won an unpopular split decision over Keith Paris, 130, of New Glasgow, N.S., in an eight-round semi-final. It was an even contest all the way with both fighters scoring in stand-off battling. Boos greeted the verdict.

A five-round curtain raiser between Mooney Clarke, 135, of Sydney Mines, N.S., and Joe Aitken, 136, of New Waterford, N.S., developed into a pier brawl with the stronger, better conditioned Clarke gaining the unanimous decision. Aitkens slipped several times for no counts and took three nine counts. Referee John Joe MacLean took one round from Clarke for hitting low.

Durelle Wins Decision Over Warrington

MONCTON, N. B., July 2—(CP)—Yvon Durelle pitted youth and two-fisted fire power against the experience of Terrence (Tiger) Warrington, Canadian light heavyweight champion, to pound out an unanimous, 10-round decision over the Liverpool, N. S., Tiger, here Saturday night. Durelle weighed 162, Warrington 177. Warrington's title was not at stake.

Durelle, husky Bale Ste. Anne, N. B. lobster fisherman, piled up a wide point margin over the ageing Warrington and early in the 10th round he unleashed a two-fisted attack.

Warrington stalked his younger opponent most of the way, but was unable to connect solidly. He repeatedly drove Durelle into the corners but the youthful slugger was able to fight his way out of trouble at close quarters.

Howard Leslie, 147, of Saint John, N. B., scored an unanimous decision over Johnnie Harvey, 144, of Moncton, in the six-round semi-final.
