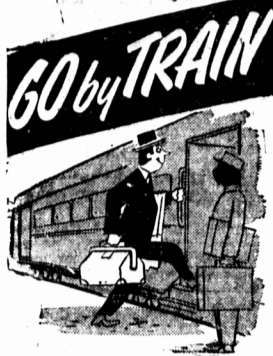

Churchill Calls On The Queen

LONDON, (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill called on the Queen at Windsor Castle Sunday night for the first time since he left London on doctor's orders to rest. The visit strengthened belief the 78-year-old British leader may soon be well enough to resume full duties. The nature of Churchill's chat with the Queen was not disclosed. Buckingham Palace announced at the same time that the Queen will leave next Tuesday for Balmoral Castle in Scotland on her annual August vacation. Churchill may have gone to bid the Queen goodbye. Churchill's temporary retirement was announced with dramatic suddenness June 27 together with a doctor's report which said the prime minister needed at least a month's rest. He was described as suffering from general fatigue due to the burdens of public office. Nine days ago he was well enough to move from his private country residence Chartwell, to his official country home, Chequers.

Hint of Truce In Indo-China

LONDON, (Reuters)—Moscow issued a hint Sunday that the Communists may be ready for a truce in the only "hot war" left in the world—the seven-year-old jungle battle between French Union forces and the Vietnamese Communists in Indo-China. The paper said the "Navarre plan" recently "submitted to the United States," provided for a series of offensive operations. Gen. Henri Navarre, French commander-in-chief in Indo-China, has a plan for resumption of military initiative to demonstrate to the Vietnamese Communist rebels they cannot hope for victory. He wants more arms and from 15,000 to 20,000 more men. The French government has not yet endorsed his plan, but would probably do so if assured that the U.S. would aid France in Indo-China. Red Star added that "the purpose of American interference is to extend the war and make it possible for American monopolies to seize key positions in Indo-China."
