**Let's Talk It Over**  
by "A"

Much has been said and written the past year about the problem of the vanishing schoolteacher, and what to do about it. Less training is the cure which some people advocate. More young men and women will come into the profession if the door is opened a little wider, they say, and as far as it goes, this is probably true. If they did not have to go to college at all, and were given teaching licenses when they graduate from the village school, there is little doubt that the teacher-supply problem would be solved. That is, the quantity problem would be solved. The quality problem would be in a more hopeless mess than ever.

As long as the teaching profession in Prince Edward Island remains the ugly duckling it now is, this will be the problem of the legislators. How much do we dare lower the quality in order that the quantity may be adequate to fill our island schools? It seems pretty well established that if you attempt to raise the quality by requiring more teacher training, the quantity will dwindle to the point where island schools will be vacant. Indeed, if the amount of training now required remains static, there is grave danger of an acute shortage of teachers resulting.

Make teaching conditions more pleasant, someone advises, and various other side-show attractions are suggested to help make teachers more satisfied with their lot. We don't believe any of these things are taken into consideration by the young man or woman who contemplates teaching as a career, or even as a stepping stone to other careers, or as a stop-gap employment in the interval before marriage. Is there a "future" in it? The career candidate asks himself. Is there even a "present" in it, the stepping-stone and stop-gap boys and girls query.

Most of them decide there is not, simply because they can do better financially by going into other work. The teaching profession was comparatively under-paid ten or fifteen years ago. It is much more so today. Because salaries for teachers haven't kept pace even in the percentage of advances with the salaries of other industries. Let us quote from MacLean's article on hospitals. "In 1939 a general duty nurse earned fifty dollars a month; she now gets almost two hundred a month." And the highly significant statement which follows: "Even with these increases we haven't yet caught up to the rates being paid by industry."

Members of our Government like to get up before public gatherings and boast of the number of times they've raised the teachers' salaries since coming into office. To us, it sounds like a 21 year old man boasting: "Sixteen years ago it took me 25 seconds to run the 100 yards. Now I can do it in 15 seconds. Marvellous progress, is it not?"
