

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, June 4. The News summarizes the latest observations regarding the condition of the crops as follows:—Growing crops vary much in condition and promise on different soils, but in general are excessively backward. A large proportion of the grain crop is deficient in the plant, and the present prospect is for a late and not very prolific harvest, while there will be an inferior hay crop and a moderate grazing season.

The World's special London cable says: Mr. Parnell's speech on Friday is generally regarded as a challenge which the Government cannot afford to overlook. Nobody expects the Government to proceed against Mr. Parnell personally. He is taking care to avail himself of his parliamentary privilege, but Ministers consider the sign—both in Ireland and England—of an approaching crisis to be far graver than yet known. Mr. Parnell's remarks about a general strike against rents, which he hypocritically declared he had not advised, disclose a policy earnestly advocated by many influential Leaguers. Parnell's friends say he would readily adopt it, but fears to provoke a decisive conflict for which the Home Rulers are not ready. Mr. Parnell adheres steadily to the one idea that the present land agitation must be made subsidiary to the promotion of the political independence of Ireland. He neither strongly denies nor deprecates what he yesterday threatened—entire loss of the landlord's property. The real key to Parnell's speech was the phrase declaring that the Irish are saturated with disaffection, and justly so, and threatening an appeal to physical force. Ministers and everybody else agree that this language seriously aggravates the existing troubles, increases the probability of a collision on a still greater scale, and imperils the life of every unpopular landlord. It is understood that Mr. Parnell hopes, not to bring on a general rising, but to incite resistance in each case of process serving on such a scale as to prevent the effective use of the police and military, excepting in great numbers, so as to paralyze evictions. Whatever Parnell's particular purpose may be English feeling is rising, and demands that the Government shall show more decision and energy than lately.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

MADRID, June 7. The active electoral preparations of the Carlists in the north and east provinces, and the recent communications passed between the pretender and his agents in those districts and in Madrid, have decided the Government to order the authorities to watch their movements. The party has shown increased boldness since its local successes in provincial and municipal elections. The army of occupation under Marshal Quesada, 20,000 strong, will be kept up in the Basque provinces, as the Cabinet possesses information of a powerful organization of Carlists under pretext of the elections. It seems that these intrigues were denounced by the Spanish consuls in France and by the civil authorities of the north of Spain since the month of March. The Cabinet is quite determined to repress very severely any agitation, and it would be backed by the public opinion of the Conservatives and Liberals against Carlism.

PARIS, June 7.

A young man styling himself the Comte d'Aulnoy shot himself last night in a box at the Grand Opera. He is not, as was stated in some morning papers, an American, but is from Toulouse. He discharged four shots at himself. The consternation of the audience may be imagined. He is now at the Beaujon hospital, and is likely to recover. He maintains the strictest reserve as to the motives of the attempted suicide, but the cause is believed to be family troubles. His real name is not known. He is only sixteen years of age. As the audience were leaving at the close of the opera a quarrel, followed by blows and an exchange of cards, took place between some gentlemen in front of the Cafe de la Paix. This second affair is said to be connected with the tragedy of the opera, a *dame en blanc* being said to be at the bottom of it all.

UNITED STATES.

JACKSON, Tenn., June 7. Rev. Dr. Newbery, of Kentucky, was killed yesterday by J. J. Oaks of Elk Valley. Oaks eloped with Newbery's daughter and married her. Newbery pursued with four others, and, surrounding the house where Oaks was, approached the door with drawn revolvers. Oaks met Newbery at the door and shot him dead. Oaks is in custody.

Queen Victoria's Age Contrasted with that of Other Sovereigns of England.

On May 24 Queen Victoria attained her 62nd birthday, an age which has been exceeded by eleven only of the sovereigns of England, dating from the Norman conquest—namely, Henry I., who attained 67 years; Henry II., 65 years; Edward I., 67 years; Edward III., 65 years; Queen Elizabeth, 69 years; James II., 68 years; George I., 67 years; George II., 77 years; George III., 82 years; George IV., 68 years; and William IV., 72 years. On the 20th of June next she will have reigned forty-four years, a period which has been exceeded by four English sovereigns only—namely, Henry III., who reigned 56 years; Edward III., who reigned for 53 years; Queen Elizabeth, who reigned 45 years; and George III., 60 years.

The Good Effected by Canada's Gift to Ireland.

THE News states that when the \$100,000 voted by the Canadian Parliament reached Ireland, the funds held by or provided for the respective Relief Committees there were deemed sufficient to meet the immediate demand for food, and it was, therefore, decided that the Canadian contribution should be used in distressed fishing districts where the people suffered for want of fishing piers, boats and fishing gear generally. The money supplemented by local subscriptions, has been expended for these purposes, with very satisfactory results. The piers provided are proving extremely useful, and the boats and fishing gear have been the means of bettering the condition of a large number of poor families. A Dublin journal, referring to this matter, says, among other things:— "We hope the great success of this fund will be the harbinger of better days for Irish fishermen, and that, profiting by the lessons of experience, they will still more fully recognize the importance of industry and perseverance, rather than agitation."
