Street Paving Program Begins

Work on the second year's part of Summerside's permanent street paving program has started by the contractor, Morrison and MacRae Ltd. One strip of cement has been laid the length of Beatty Avenue and on Saturday one strip was commenced on the section of Notre Dame Street that remains to be done.

These streets, as were the two miles built last year, will all be done with concrete. The completion of the paving of Notre Dame Street will give the town two main entrances from west and should ease the traffic situation on Water Street West considerably.

Motorists will probably prefer to travel on newly paved Notre Dame Street than on Water Street West where the pavement is in terribly bad condition, being full of holes.—S.

Fine Display Of Handicraft

The exhibition of handicraft on display in St. Paul's Church basement was viewed yesterday by a large number of parishioners and was a revelation to most as far as the high quality of the work is concerned. The work in the display was produced by the pupils of St. Mary's Academy and consisted of a large variety of subjects all of a high order.
