Penticton And Czechs Tied 3-3

LONDON (Reuters)—Penticton Vs. Canadian entry in the world hockey championships. Sunday night played a 3-3 tie with the Czech national team in a pre-tournament exhibition game in Prague.

Prague radio said each team scored a goal a period and the Czechs were leading 3-2 until the Canadians got the tying goal in the final minute of the game.

The Czech radio commentator said that in the final 10 minutes of the third period, when the Czechs were ahead, the game became "more like a boxing contest."

"The Canadians have started playing more like boxer in a ring than ice hockey players," he said. "Canadians—you may play like that in Canada but here we are in Europe."

Listeners to Prague radio could hear the crowd booning after the game ended. The commentator said: "You may now hear the crowd's reaction as the Canadians are leaving the rink."

The game was watched by 14,000 fans in Prague's Winter Stadium. A description of the game was broadcast by Prague radio and also televised.

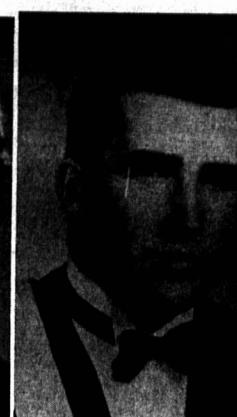

Rain And Fog At Sydney Delay Arrival Of Curlers

Canadian Press Staff Writer SYDNEY (CP)—A dirty, drizzling rain and a pea-soup fog kept the airport here closed Saturday and forced curlers taking part in the Dominion high-school bonspiel to cool their heels for six hours in Halifax before making the trip by bus.

Ten rinks, representing every province but Newfoundland—two are from Ontario—will compete for the Thurston trophy from today to Thursday.

Technical collegiate of Saskatoon is the defending champion and skip Bayne Secord is looking for his second championship. Last year's bonspiel was held at Hamilton.

Only two rinks, Nova Scotia's Colchester county academy, from Truro and Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, representing Prince Edward Island, arrived here on schedule. New Brunswick was not due until this morning.

Meanwhile, anxious bonspiel officials were kept on the hop Sunday cancelling a buffet supper and entertainment and arranging to have the seven rinks stranded in Halifax brought on by bus.

The official draw scheduled for Sunday afternoon was not held until late Sunday night but a church service, part of the opening program, went off as scheduled.

Research On Butter Texture

EDMONTON (CP)—Texture of butter is the subject of a research project at the University of Alberta.

Texture is chiefly a matter of plasticity, says Prof. F. W. Wood, project director. In summer butter tends to be soft and greasy. In winter it becomes brittle and lacks "spreadability." A uniform texture at all times is sought.

Chemical or structural changes occur in the fatty acids of butterfat which influence plasticity. Composition of the fat cannot be altered but texture of the product may be modified by alterations in processing.

TREND AWAY FROM BATCH

The question of texture came into prominence with introduction of newer butter-making methods. The trend today in food manufacture is to eliminate the batch process and replace it with continuous-production method. Uniformity, reduced cost and quality improvement are some of the objectives.

In the dairy industry, milk pasteurization and manufacture of ice cream and evaporated milk have followed this pattern but only recently has the continuous butter-making process been introduced.

The federal agriculture department asked the dairying branch at the University of Alberta to conduct texture tests. The only continuous machine in Canada at the time was in Edmonton but it produced 1,000 pounds an hour and the researchers had to build a model with a capacity of about 25 pounds an hour.

The new machine allows University of Alberta scientists to study the manufacturing process in detail and to record with precision structural or other changes as they occur.
