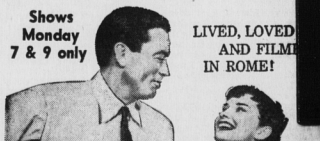

Site of Proposed Dam At Montague Examined

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN L. W. McCarthy, who is with the Maritime Marshlands Rehabilitation Authority, visited Montague Thursday, to examine the site of the proposed dam on the Sutherland stream, P. A. Murnaghan, deputy minister of industry and natural resources, accompanied Mr. McCarthy.

The proposed dam will most likely be built on the Valley field stream near its junction with the Montague river.

It is proposed to raise the water to a depth of approximately 10 to 12 feet. This would flood an area approximately one mile up stream. The project supported by the Southern Fish and Game Association and proposed by the Town of Montague and Mr. Murnaghan and his department will be a tremendous asset to sport fishing and can also make one of the most beautiful parks in the province.

Crown Presents Evidence In Copper Possession Case

The case of James Solomon Sterling Falls, charged with the possession of copper wire obtained by the indictable offence of theft, was brought before Magistrate A. J. Haslam, Q.C. in a police court.

Crown prosecutor Allan Scoble called two witnesses, both having been previously convicted on similar charges. The first, Paul Joseph Pineau, denied any knowledge of the defendant being in their company the two nights the alleged thefts were committed. Prosecutor Scoble then applied to have the witness declared hostile. Defence Attorney A. Gilis objected but the application was granted by

Magistrate Haslam. The case was adjourned to Oct. 18.

Allan Charles Robb was then called to the stand as a crown witness and again prosecutor Scoble applied to have the witness declared hostile and again Mr. Gilis objected. This time Mr. Scoble withdrew his application. Both witnesses are awaiting transport to Dorchester penitentiary.

The case of Albert E. Murphy charged with the witness of the defendant's behalf: Weston Trainer, Reginald Mahar and Raymond Goss, all of Charlottetown.

The case of Joseph Goss charged as he obtained recognition from two bondsmen for bonds of \$20 each. Goss was given a one year suspended sentence on a drunk and disorderly charge at a previous court session.

David Warren Rodd, charged with possession of liquor at a place other than his residence was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

David Sylvester Bird charged with the theft of more than \$50 dollars and escaping custody was remanded to Oct. 18.

The case of Ray Evans of St. Theresa, charged with procuring a witness to give evidence in a case, and caution was adjourned to Oct. 12.

A man was fined \$5 and costs or two days for failing to obey a stop sign.

Explosion Reported

Police said they had no report of any explosion.

Head Of SDU Chemistry Dept. Awarded PhD By Fordham U.

Rev. Regis Duffy, head of the chemistry department of St. Dunstan's University, has recently been awarded the Doctor of Philosophy degree in chemistry from Fordham University, it was announced by Very Rev. George A. Macdonald, president of St. Dunstan's. The degree was formally conferred at Fordham in New York City next February.

Dr. Duffy, 30, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Duffy, Kinross. He attended school at Kinross and entered St. Dunstan's University in 1949, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1953. He then entered Holy Heart Seminary, Halifax, and was ordained to the priesthood in 1957.

He began his graduate studies at Fordham in September of that year, completing his master's research program in the field of geochemistry and being awarded his Master of Science degree in 1960.

Dr. Duffy is co-author of two publications in the scientific field. For his doctor of philosophy thesis he studied the program of resistance to DDT and related insecticides in a species of mosquito responsible for yellow fever in the tropics. His results have contributed to the understanding of how mosquito metabolism DDT and why resistance develops in this and other species.

This problem has been under much discussion by the public in recent months as the result of Rachel Carson's book, "Silent Spring."

A part of Dr. Duffy's research program was carried out at Fordham with the remainder being completed at the University of Western Ontario under the mentorship of the noted Canadian entomologist, A. W. A. Brown.
