### Third Miner Alive, Rescued Pair Feel

HAZLETON, B.C. (AP)—Miners Henry Thorne and David Fellin say they feel sure that Louis Bova, the man trapped with them more than 300 feet underground when a coal mine caved in Aug. 13, is still alive. Both Thorne, 39, and Fellin, 58, were rescued in the pre-dawn hours of Tuesday and taken in hospital where they were reported in excellent condition.
