A FREDERICTON SCANDAL.—A late despatch from Fredericton, N. B., says: J. G. Fraser Gregory, son of George F. Gregory, Q. C. of Fredericton, and book-keeper for W. H. Murray, of this city, has been placed under arrest on a writ issued at the instance of Herbert G. Beman, of Boston, charging him with alienating his wife's affections.
